# "In This Place I Will Bring Peace"

Then the LORD sent this message through the prophet Haggai: "Why are you living in luxurious houses while my house lies in ruins? This is what the LORD of Heaven's Armies says: Look at what's happening to you! You have planted much but harvest little. You eat but are not satisfied. You drink but are still thirsty. You put on clothes but cannot keep warm. Your wages disappear as though you were putting them in pockets filled with holes! "This is what the LORD of Heaven's Armies says: Look at what's happening to you! Now go up into the hills, bring down timber, and rebuild my house. (Haggai 1)

The Book of Haggai consists of two short chapters (in my Bible it's 2 pages long). Our Biblical prophets are not so much fortune/future tellers as they are "forth tellers," meaning they speak a word of truth about the current state of affairs. Haggai is diagnosing a set of symptoms. Symptom one is that the people have confused their priorities. They have been focusing on their own priorities and not God's priorities, and they are floundering. Nothing seems to satisfy their deepest needs because they are trying to fill their deepest needs with stuff and fluff. Haggai is also giving a prognosis; if their priorities are not changed, they will cease to have any identity or be a people of God. Symptom 2 is that the temple lies in ruins, which is also an outward sign of their weakened spiritual health.

Israel, the Northern Kingdom of God, has already been captured by Assyria. The people of Israel have been taken into captivity and blended in with the prevailing pagan culture. The people of Israel cease to exist forever. The Southern Kingdom, known as Judah, was captured by Babylonia in 605 BCE and held in captivity. In 539 BCE, Babylonia was conguered by Persia under the rule of Cyrus the Great, and the people of Judah were allowed to go home.

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#### A LETTER TO THE BETHLEHEM CHURCH CONGREGATION

September 25, 2016

Dear Bethlehem Church Members,

This letter supplements the information that was shared last week regarding the elimination of the Associate Pastor position from our current staff.

The future direction of Bethlehem continues to be an urgent matter. Our congregation has been in transition for more than five years. The new governance structure and the Bylaws that this congregation adopted on October 19, 2014, charge the Leadership Council and the pastor with the responsibility of setting the strategic direction of the church.

As we worked to accomplish this, it was clear that we needed to establish a new course. With this as our goal, we are focusing on new models of staffing which may include creating one or two part-time positions. We have identified two basic fundamentals of our mission that require immediate attention. One is to have a staff member whose only duty is to develop engaging programs for our children and youth. The person(s) hired for this position will be expected to work closely with staff and lay leaders to implement ideas that enhance our vision and goals. We also need a staff member whose entire task is to broaden the scope of offerings that allow every member to increase and strengthen their faith. When these areas are strong, they offer a natural pathway for the congregation to grow.

Preliminary discussion around how to achieve these two goals has occurred. However, we will create opportunities for every member to share their ideas and desires.

Three members who have played a large part in leading the youth program, Sarah Herwick, C.J. Slotten, and Jesse Wilcox, volunteered to continue the program that is set up for this year. They are committed to this until we are able to fulfill staff changes.

Greg has been with us through some difficult times—Martha's sudden departure, Don's term as interim, and our search for a settled pastor. We appreciate the continuity and leadership he provided during this period. We recognize that Greg is a passionate, devoted leader; we wish him all the best as he seeks his next position. Because of the many strong relationships Greg had in the congregation, Leadership Council again encourages that individual expressions of thanks and appreciation be extended to Greg. These can be sent directly to him or brought to the office where Carol will forward them to Greg. Any checks should be written directly to Greg Briggs.

We look forward to your presence and assistance as we reinvigorate Bethlehem's mission.

#### "In This Place I Will Bring Peace" Rev. Kennedy (continued from page 1)

When they returned home the great temple of Solomon was in ruins. The people began to rebuild their homes and they didn't just rebuild their homes, many began to add one lavish luxury after another. They were acting as separate individuals each with their own personal agenda instead of uniting in solidarity behind God's bigger vision. God blesses nations only when they were willing to be a blessing to other people and nations.

Then I will take pleasure in it and be honored, says the LORD. You hoped for rich harvests, but they were poor. And when you brought your harvest home, I blew it away. Why? Because my house lies in ruins, says the LORD of Heaven's Armies, while all of you are busy building your own fine houses. (Haggai 1)

Haggai tells his nation that God is not against them but wants them to flourish but that only happens when they put their priorities in sync with God's priorities. While they rebuild the temple, they will be united as a people by a bigger purpose and relearn what it means to be filled in their hearts and souls. Haggai tells them that they will not be alone, God will be with them, and God ignited the enthusiasm and morale of the whole people. Nothing is as contagious as hope, a meaningful vision, and a sense of progress.

Then Haggai, the LORD's messenger, gave the people this message from the LORD: "I am with you, says the LORD!" So the LORD sparked the enthusiasm...of the whole remnant of God's people. They began to work on the house of their God, the LORD of Heaven's Armies, on September 21, of the second year of King Darius's reign.

Sometimes when the work begins it can seem overwhelming. When workers set out to do a job and find that there is far more work involved than it first seemed. As many of you know, the parsonage has been undergoing major repairs. Not luxury items but things like a new driveway, electrical repair, heating and air conditioning, and siding. When

Randy Schneider and his crew began removing the old aluminum siding, they found extensive sections of rotten wood throughout the house and garage. The wood floor joists were so rotten that the garage was not even attached to the concrete slab and the garage shook when it was hit with just a hand. Old wooden windows were so rotted out that the entire frames had to be completely rebuilt. The heating and air conditioning was 38 years old, and the electrical panel was considered a fire risk. One church member made a comment that "I was in the parsonage for the Christmas party and it seemed fine to me." Often what is out of sight is out of mind, yet the workers are the ones who can see the true condition beneath the service. So can God and prophets.

Our beautiful church complex was built in three stages: the sanctuary in 1895 (126 years ago), the 1933 addition (83 years ago), and the 1966 addition (50 years ago). Our sanctuary is absolutely beautiful, but our newest section is a half a century old. Many have worked hard on repairing and maintaining our facility, yet there are many needs inside the beautiful granite exterior. The issues involve major infrastructure repairs in a world that has changed dramatically in the past 83 years and even 50 years ago. When our church complex was built, it was in a neighborhood of children, families, yards, and schools around the corner. Today we are in the city and hoping for children in a neighborhood where there are few. In our world, fully heated and air-conditioned and handicappedaccessible buildings are expected, and so are convenient parking and green spaces for activities.

On any given week many of us only see a fraction of our building, but our Facilities Ministry Team is aware of the growing list of issues and the Finance Ministry Team is aware of the expenses every month that new bills come due from unbudgeted repairs. Our church facility is meant to serve the ministries of the church and of the members who participate in the life of our faith community. (continued on next page)



We are not meant to serve the building, but the building is meant to serve God as we serve others, too.

God is not done with Bethlehem UCC. There is much left to experience and do. God is calling out to us to rebuild the temple and not just our facilities. God is calling us to rebuild our faith family, our vision, and our ministries. Let us be strong and go to work, for God is with us. The future glory of Bethlehem can be greater, and in this place God will bring peace to us and through us.

Then on October 17 of that same year, the LORD sent another message through the prophet Haggai...to the remnant of God's people there in the land: 'Does anyone remember this house—this Temple—in its former splendor? How, in comparison, does it look to you now? It must seem like nothing at all! But now the LORD says: Be strong, all you people still left in the land. And now get to work, for I am with you, says the LORD of Heaven's Armies. The future glory of this Temple will be greater than its past glory, says the LORD of Heaven's Armies. And in this place I will bring peace. I, the LORD of Heaven's Armies, have spoken!" (Haggai 2)

## Pastor John Neumann, 1877 - 1903

On January 4, 1845 ,a building site had been purchased at the northeast corner of First and Washington streets. In 1849 the congregation dedicated the building, and it was given the name of "Bethlehem Church."

Pastor John Neumann from Bethel Church in Freedom Township came to Bethlehem Church in 1877. He was born March 21, 1841, in Imbsheim near Strasbourg in Alsace. Neumann studied at the Basel Mission House in Switzerland and came to America in 1867.

A lot was available on Fourth Avenue, and the hope that the congregation might someday build a new church here motivated the congregation to build a parsonage on a part of this site. In our church at the northeast corner of First and Washington in 1883 Bethlehem Church celebrated its 50th anniversary. A report for the Friedensbote, official publication of the Evangelical Synod, wrote, "May the Lord preserve and increase this hunger for the Word of God at Bethlehem Church...with all of her descendants here on earth still faithful to their calling."
