Holy Week begins in a few short days. I hope you will come to Bethlehem and bring a friend to hear the story of Jesus and his love for each of you. The events of Holy Week are at the very core and bedrock of our Christian faith. If there were one key time to come and hear a story that reminds, teaches, and guides our children and us, it is this week of events. So, yes, we will be there at Bethlehem to remember and celebrate that God loves us with no take-backs.

On Palm Sunday, we will celebrate the story of Jesus' triumphant march into Jerusalem. Following this service, we will celebrate with a Palm Sunday brunch and activities in the Willimann Fellowship Hall.



⁶The two disciples did as Jecommanded. ⁷Thev sus brought the donkey and the colt to him and threw their garments over the colt, and he sat on it. 8Most of the crowd spread their garments on the road ahead of him, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. ⁹Jesus was in the center of the procession, and the people all around him were shouting, "Praise God for the Son of David! Blessings on the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Praise God in highest heaven!" ¹⁰The entire city of Jerusalem was in an uproar as he entered. "Who is this?" they asked. (Matthew 21:6-10)

On Maundy Thursday, we will gather in the gallery for a remembrance of the Last Supper. It will not be a "traditional" service, but a time where we gather in candlelight around the tables in a common meal of bread and wine (juice). The setting is intimate and compelling and is appropriate for all ages, and we will have cello music from a very gifted musician.



Interested in local history? See what is happening April 5th

On Wednesday, April 5 from 12-1, Barbara Foster will speak at the Kempf House historical museum located at 312 S. Division in Ann Arbor. The subject is Pastor Frederick Schmid, who was sent in 1833 as a missionary from Basel, Switzerland, to the German settlers in southeast, Michigan. Walking or traveling by horseback, he founded about 20 churches including Zion and Bethlehem in Ann Arbor.

Some music familiar to German pioneers in the mid 1800's will also be performed. Kempf House, built in 1853, was home to a German-American musical family. There is a Steinway Concert grand piano from 1877 and an Allmendinger pump organ.



²⁶As they were eating, Jesus took some bread and blessed it. Then he broke it in pieces and gave it to the disciples, saying, "Take this and eat it, for this is my body." ²⁷And he took a cup of wine and gave thanks to God for it. He gave it to them and said, "Each of you drink from it, ²⁸for this is my blood, which confirms the covenant between God and his people. It is poured out as a sacrifice to forgive the sins of many. ²⁹Mark my words—I will not drink wine again until the day I drink it new with you in my Father's Kingdom." ³⁰Then they sang a hymn and went out to the Mount of Olives. (Matthew 26:26-30)

On Good Friday at 12 noon in the chapel and at 7 p.m. in the sanctuary, we will hear the story of Jesus' crucifixion and death. It will be a moving Tenebrae service (of shadows and light) with the handbell and chancel choirs helping us "feel" the story of such incredible sacrifice and love.



19 Then Pilate had Jesus flogged with a leadtipped whip. ²The soldiers wove a crown of thorns and put it on his head, and they put a purple robe on him. ³"Hail! King of the Jews!" they mocked, as they slapped him across the face. ⁴Pilate went outside again and said to the people, "I am going to bring him out to you now, but understand clearly that I find him not guilty." ⁵Then Jesus came out wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. And Pilate said, "Look, here is the man!" 6When they saw him, the leading priests and Temple quards began shouting, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" ²³When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they divided his clothes among the four of them. They also took his robe, but it was seamless, woven in one piece from top to

bottom. ²⁴So they said, "Rather than tearing it apart, let's throw dice for it." This fulfilled the Scripture that says, "They divided my garments among themselves and threw dice for my clothing." So that is what they did. ²⁵Standing near the cross were Jesus' mother, and his mother's sister, Mary (the wife of Clopas), and Mary Magdalene. ²⁶When Jesus saw his mother standing there beside the disciple he loved, he said to her, "Dear woman, here is your son." ²⁷And he said to this disciple, "Here is your mother." And from then on this disciple took her into his home. ²⁸Jesus knew that his mission was now finished, and

to fulfill Scripture he said, "I am thirsty." ²⁹A jar of sour wine was sitting there, so they soaked a sponge in it, put it on a hyssop branch, and held it up to his lips. ³⁰When Jesus had tasted it, he said, "It is finished!" Then he bowed his head and released his spirit. ³¹It was the day of preparation, and the Jewish leaders didn't want the bodies hanging there the next day, which was the

Sabbath (and a very special Sabbath, because it was the Passover). So they asked Pilate to hasten their deaths by ordering that their legs be broken. Then their bodies could be taken down. 31So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the two men crucified with Jesus. 33 But when they came to Jesus, they saw that he was already dead, so they didn't break his legs. 34One of the soldiers, however, pierced his side with a spear, and immediately blood and water flowed out. 35 (This report is from an eyewitness giving an accurate account. He speaks the truth so that you also may continue to believe.) ³⁶These things happened in fulfillment of the Scriptures that say, "Not one of his bones will be broken,"

³⁷and "They will look on the one they pierced."
³⁸Afterward Joseph of Arimathea, who had been a secret disciple of Jesus (because he feared the Jewish leaders), asked Pilate for permission to take down Jesus' body. When Pilate gave permission, Joseph came and took the body away.
³⁹With him came Nicodemus, the man who had come to Jesus at night. He brought about seventy-five pounds of perfumed ointment made from myrrh and aloes. ⁴⁰Following Jewish burial custom, they wrapped Jesus' body with the spices in long sheets of linen cloth. ⁴¹The place of crucifixion was near a garden, where there was a new tomb, never used before. ⁴²And so, because it

was the day of preparation for the Jewish Passover and since the tomb was close at hand, they laid Jesus there. (John 19)

On Easter morning, we will return to the tomb and find that it is empty by celebrating the Resurrection of Christ Jesus with a Sunrise

Service at Bethlehem Cemetery (6:42 a.m.). At 10 a.m. in the sanctuary, we will celebrate with pageantry that "Christ the Lord Has Risen Today," with an orchestra, choir, hymns, and Communion.

¹Early on Sunday morning, as the new day was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary

went out to visit the tomb. ²Suddenly there was a great earthquake! For an angel of the Lord came down from heaven, rolled aside the stone, and sat on it. ³His face shone like lightning, and his clothing was as white as snow. ⁴The guards shook with fear when they saw him, and they fell into a dead faint. ⁵Then the angel spoke to the women. "Don't be afraid!" he said. "I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. ⁶He isn't here! He is risen from the dead, just as he said would happen. Come, see where his body was lying.

⁷And now, go quickly and tell his disciples that he has risen from the dead, and he is going ahead

of you to Galilee. You will see him there. Remember what I have told you." The women ran quickly from the tomb. They were very frightened but also filled with great joy, and they rushed to give the disciples the angel's message. And as they went, Jesus met them and greeted them. And they ran to him, grasped his

feet, and worshiped him. ¹⁰Then Jesus said to them, "Don't be afraid! Go tell my brothers to leave for Galilee, and they will see me there." (Matthew 28:1-10)

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Washtenaw Refugee Welcome

Washtenaw Refugee Welcome (WRW) is a local organization that helps support refugees and their families in our county. The highly vetted refugee families, once settled, get 90 days of assistance before they must be completely self-sufficient. WRW helps them find housing and gives them donated furniture, clothes, etc. Some of our toys and things from the Mitten Tree went to them, and they were really grateful. The families are from all around the world. We have a few things we're doing to support WRW.

- We are collecting monetary support for the organization. WRW uses the money in an emergency fund for the refugee families to help with unexpected costs and emergencies. Youth and adults are contributing to our alms collection jar during Lent. We are also hosting some fundraising activities: the Palm Sunday brunch, Easter cookie sales (youth to frost and sell on Palm Sunday), and Stone Soup Sunday, held on March 26.
- 2. We are collecting shirts and T-shirts. The director of WRW suggested that the refugees want a sense of belonging to their new home and an ability to say where home now is. We are collecting gently used and new shirts that have local logos on them, like Ann Arbor, Michigan, Washtenaw, Great Lakes State, etc. That way, the refugees can show their local pride. It is okay to have some University of Michigan shirts, but sports logos, like the block M, for example, might not quite get the point across. Nevertheless, all donations and sizes are welcome. There's a collection box in the library.

3. We are collecting bicycles. WRW notes that transportation is a challenge for new refugees. Affordable housing is often far from the city center and not even on the bus lines. WRW is asking for donations of used bikes. They will get them refurbished and donate them to families that need them. Bikes for children are also welcome.

Helping refugees is part of the work that God wants us to do.

During Lent, let's all work together to welcome the stranger.

Washtenaw Refugee Welcome gives us a way to do this.

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
Holy Week Opportunities

"Come and Find the Quiet Center" in the crowded life we lead.

"Make your ways known to me, Lord; teach me your paths"—Psalm 25:4.



Bethlehem's Labyrinth is modeled after the pavement Labyrinth at the Chartes Cathedral in France.

The labyrinth is a universal prayer path; it has only one route, and you can't get lost or travel it the wrong way. In ancient times, when pilgrims could not travel long distances to pray, they walked the labyrinth. We can't physically go to Gethsemane or Calvary, but we can witness and pray as we walk the labyrinth.


Bethlehem's Labyrinth will be open from
