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SMALL THINGS, GREAT LOVE

"What I do, you cannot do; but what you do, I cannot do. The needs are great, and none of us, including me, ever do great things. But we can all do small things with great love, and together we can do something wonderful."

-Mother Teresa

As UCC members gathering in Baltimore for General Synod this week aspire to embody a "formal church witness" to the needs of our world and to "the Stillspeaking God," we here at Bethlehem are seeking to do the same. Each month, in our own ways, we work to support and grow a Bethlehem that answers the call of Jesus – a community that meets the needs of individuals, celebrates the gifts of community members, and supports the manifestation of love and justice in our world.

Sometimes the needs we face in our individual lives, our communities, and our world seem overwhelming. We have hopes and dreams that are sometimes muted by laments and grave concerns. Where we know community and love could exist, we see division and hatred. We know Jesus came to profess a different way – an alternative to oppression, division, and inequality. We believe in that way of Love; we have committed ourselves to it. Still, the realities can seem so daunting.

Sometimes when things seem daunting, I find comfort in 1 Corinthians 12. In First Corinthians, Paul is writing to an early community of Jesus followers.

The community ("The church of God that is in Corinth") is situated in the context of the City of Corinth, a city, which the Roman Empire destroyed and then colonized, and where the outcasts of Rome had been sent. The community addressed in Paul's letter is in conflict.

In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul affirms the "varieties of gifts" we find in communities: "To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good" (1 Corinthians 12:4; 12:7). Paul uses the analogy of the body to explore community: "Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many" (12:14). Members of the body – foot, hand, ear, eye, head. Even if we deny we are members of the body, we are still part of it (12:15). Our diversity and uniqueness is essential: "If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is there are many members yet one body" (12:19).

Scholars I admire believe that, because this exploration of community precedes the famous exploration of love found in 1 Corinthians 13, it is important to understand that exploration of love not only as an instruction for how we treat one another in interpersonal relationships, but also — and, perhaps, especially — for how we are to treat one another in community. Community where nobody is excluded (12:15); community where God gives "the great honor to the inferior member" (12:25); community where "if one member suffers, all suffer together with it" (12:26).

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So, this text comforts me in several ways:

- It reminds me that conflict is not new. It affirms that we can build loving, liberating community – even in struggle – in the midst of injustice and oppression.
- It assures me that my gifts and talents are critical to building the loving world we seek; but no more critical than the gifts and talents everyone else has. I can take my piece and I must strive to do my best, but I don't have to do it all.
- It affirms coming together in community family, Bethlehem, civic organizations and non-profits, the UCC Synod in Baltimore, the global church to witness to the needs of the world.
- It reminds me that love isn't always easy, but it is beautiful!
- It proclaims that we are part of something much bigger than ourselves, and that our gifts and talents are critical in the collective work of manifesting love and justice in the vast and interconnected web of existence.

I've seen some of the many talents and gifts you bring to your families and friends, to our community here at Bethlehem, and to our world.

I've been inspired by the ways you live into your faith and your love of Bethlehem, honor your hopes for Bethlehem, and embody your visions for our world.

May we find comfort and inspiration this month. May we be loved and honored for the fullness of who we are. May we love and honor others for the fullness of who they are. May our talents shine, and our needs be met. May our fears be honored, and our joys be celebrated. May we bring joy and comfort to those who fear. May we find connection where we might otherwise be lonely. May we be connection for those who feel isolated. In the spirit of Mother Teresa, may the small things we do with great love have ripples beyond our wildest imagination - and, together, may we do something wonderful.



Notes from the June Leadership Council Meeting

- Three Stephen Leaders will be attending training in August. Classes for Stephen Ministers will be held in the fall.
- Lily is working to set up an intergenerational mission trip for August. Next year there will be an intergenerational mission trip as well as one for youth only.
- Pastor John informed us the church has received a substantial bequest from Lois Haeussler.
- The Leadership Council accepted recommendations from the Finance Team to use Hutzel funds to cover Groundcover rent for July to December and authorize Ken Tappe and Jeff Wortman to direct Bank of Ann Arbor regarding our Investment Account.
- The sanctuary lighting project will move forward as approved by the congregation in Jan 2016.

- Capital Improvements:
 - * The Facilities Team should obtain bids for all structural issues.
 - Prioritization of capital projects will be done by representatives from the Leadership Council and the Facilities Team, with final approval by the Leadership Council.
 - * The main hallway and entry will be painted.
 - * The two restrooms on the first floor in the office hallway and the one on the sanctuary level will be renovated.
 - * The Leadership Council along with members of the Facilities Team will be working on a plan for renovation of the fellowship hall.
- Website changes: Ministry teams will send any changes for their pages to the office.
- Pastor John will form the Stewardship Team with the help of Sue Buday.

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General Synod of the United Church of Christ - At a Glance

For five days, from June 30 – July 4, The General Synod of the UCC will convene in Baltimore, Maryland. Here are some basics about General Synod for those of us following from home!

A summary of General Synod

"Every two years, General Synod brings together thousands of faithful members of the United Church of Christ for formal church witness, inspirational worship, and fellowship with friends (new and old). "In June 2017, thousands from across the country (and abroad) will gather for General Synod 2017 at the Baltimore Convention Center in Baltimore, Maryland. Together, we will discern resolutions of witness, church structure, and function. We will stand up for issues that demand a faithful witness. And we will join together in worship each day to lift up the Stillspeaking God.

Synod 101* — What Is Synod? Seven Things:

- I. The Church
 - a. Synod is one of the four components of The United Church of Christ. Synod "speaks to, and not for, other settings of the church." The four components of the UCC are:
 - i. Local Churches
 - ii. Associations
 - iii. Conferences
 - iv. Synod
- II. An Occasion for Worship and Inspiration
 - a. Worship with famous and less known speakers, Bible studies.
- III. A Business Meeting
 - a. Synod is a business meeting governed by certain rules.
 - i. Business meetings include delegates and are open to the public and the news media, with a podium, a gavel, and votes on motions.
- IV. A Place for Leadership and Policy Setting
 - a. Synod sets policies for the work of UCC's national ministries. While these policies are not mandates, they often "set a tone" by "urging, requesting, encouraging, or recommending" items for the UCC nationwide.
 - b. There are two types of resolutions considered at Synod:
 - i. Resolutions of Witness
 - 1. Resolutions of Witness address moral, ethical, or religious matters and require a 2/3 vote to pass.
 - ii. Prudential Resolutions
 - 1. Prudential Resolutions address policy, structure, or procedure, authorize programs, or request actions. They require a simple majority to pass.

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V. An Electing Body

- a. Synod elects several key leaders in the UCC, including:
 - i. Officers of the UCC, who are elected to staggered 4-year terms.
 - ii. Synod Moderator and Synod Assistant Moderator
 - iii. UCC Board of Directors

VI. An Experience

- a. Attendees hear speeches and sermons, experience worship and arts, attend workshops, and more.
- b. Those gathered respond to urgent matters of the world through service projects and actions.
- c. An opportunity to experience the "wholeness of the UCC and the global church on full glorious display."

VII. Ongoing

a. The work of Synod is ongoing throughout the year. The UCC Board of Directors meets at least twice yearly. The Synod Moderator and Assistant Moderator serve on the UCC Board of Directors.

Marian Caswell

June 4, 1926-April 11, 2017

At our June board meeting for Women of Bethlehem, we spent some time together remembering Marian Caswell. She was a member of our women's board for many years, and we sorely miss her gentle nature, her wisdom, and her caring spirit.

Marian was most active on our board as the kitchen supervisor. She was the person who oversaw the kitchen in general and also recruited, over the years, hundreds of volunteers to help prepare and serve meals at our

church. No matter what the occasion was, you could count on Marian to be in the kitchen or serving area giving direction to volunteers. She was also a member of the Holy Rollers pretzel group.

Marian was very active in the local Red Cross and promoted dozens of CPR training classes through the Red Cross for our congregation. She not only encouraged participation but also gave the training

herself. So many in our congregation learned this life-saving skill because of Marian.

Marian would give you the "shirt off her back." She was always ready to listen and then determine how she could help. She gave countless rides to members and friends to worship services and events. Her German potato salad and pecan pie were always sought out at church meals!

As we sat as a board and reflected on the many memories we have of Marian, the warmth of those memories filled the room. She will be sorely missed, and we are eternally grateful for the many years she was a part of our lives.

In the near future, the board will be placing a leaf on Bethlehem's Tree of Life as a small token of our gratitude for the life of Marian Caswell.

Bethlehem Cemetery Update bethlehemcemetery.net

Have you been to the Bethlehem Cemetery lately? What? You didn't know Bethlehem Church runs its own cemetery? Well, we do!

Bethlehem Cemetery is one of the oldest and prettiest cemeteries in Washtenaw County. It was

founded in 1833 when Daniel Allmendinger gave Bethlehem Church one acre of land. Since then the cemetery has grown, and more than 8060 burials have occurred. In addition to traditional burials, Bethlehem Cemetery offers niches in the columbaria for ash internment and a memorial garden for those who wish to add ashes to the earth. And don't forget: Bethlehem Church members are offered a 20% discount on burial plots and niches; military veterans are offered 10%.

Bethlehem Cemetery has gone high tech with an online site for information about the cemetery and a feature to help you find the graves of friends and family. It can be accessed at www.bethlehemcemetery.net. Give it a try!

Recently, renovations have been undertaken including new water lines for outdoor faucets and repairs to the fence and uprooted trees. Some of these repairs were necessary because of the wind storm earlier in the spring. Additionally, repairs to the roadways in the cemetery and new tree plantings are planned.



All the renovations and improvements have cost money, of course, and this is where your help would be of assistance. Donations to help cover the cost of any of these projects may be made using the designated envelopes in your church envelope packet, the white envelopes in the pews, or through the Church office.

We hope you visit Bethlehem Cemetery soon and will consider helping us carry on the long tradition of the cemetery with your donations.


