"Graduation" Rev. John L. Kennedy

"The Lord's power overcame me, and while I was in the Lord's spirit, he led me out and set me down in the middle of a certain valley. It was full of bones. He led me through them all around, and I saw that there were a great many of them on the valley floor, and they were very dry. He asked me, "Human one, can these bones live again?" I said, "Lord God, only you know." He said to me, "Prophesy over these bones, and say to them, Dry bones, hear the Lord's word! The Lord God proclaims to these bones: I am about to put breath in you, and you will live again. I will put sinews on you, place flesh on you, and cover you with skin. When I put breath in you, and you come to life, you will know that I am the Lord." -Ezekiel 37:1-5

On Sunday, June 4, 2017, Bethlehem UCC will be recognizing members who are graduating from high school, college, graduate school, etc. We will read the names and invite

the graduates to come forward and receive gifts and our recognition. We will smile, clap, pray, and perhaps remember our own graduations or those of our family members. It is one of those moments that remind us of our own progression from one time in our lives to the next.

The etymology of "graduate" pares down to the Latin word "gradus," meaning "a step climbed" (on a ladder or stair) or a "step toward something." How many times do the road forward and the first "step toward something" seem like trying to walk across an ocean or a vast desert? In the story of "The Valley of the Dry Bones," Ezekiel speaks to an exiled people who feel utterly broken, scattered, lifeless, and with no hope at all. Where Jeremiah speaks to the people of Jerusalem who have been left behind and whose families have been carried away by Babylonia, Ezekiel has actually been taken hostage and carried away with the other exiles in this new foreign land. Ezekiel and his group are refugees in a land foreign to them in every way. They cannot openly practice their religion of Judaism because it is seen as a threat to their new country. The em-



pire is afraid that if the Jews practice their faith it will lead to solidarity and that could lead to acts of rebellion.

These Jews are at their weakest and most hopeless moment. They have lost everything they had worked so hard for; their homes, land, cattle, and families have been separated. Their temple has been desecrated and destroyed. They are at a critical tipping point again.

How did they get to this point? According to Isaiah and Jeremiah, Israel is reaping the consequences of its own actions and inaction. Isaiah has flatly told the Jews that they will be exiled because they have failed as a nation, claiming to be a "Nation under God," to care for the widow, orphan, hungry, and poor. The moment they failed to do these things as a nation, they ceased to be a blessing and, therefore, lost God's blessing upon their nation. Without God's blessings, their walls could not keep the invaders out. Perhaps, in God's eyes, that which they fought so hard to acquire and protect had lost its focus so badly that it was no (continued on page 4)

longer worthy of God's divine protection? God's protection is for those who protect. God's compassion, mercy, and generosity is for nations that show compassion, mercy, and generosity. Israel failed to head the prophets' earlier warnings to avert the fall of their nation, but now they were at a tipping point again, whether to give up all hope or resist hopefully.

Ezekiel has a vision from God. God shows Ezekiel a vast valley. The valley is filled with hundreds of thousands of bones, and the bones are separated and very dry. In other words, this was the state of the once powerful and proud combined nation of Israel and Judah. As a people and nation they were broken, scattered, and dry without any resistance or hope. The leap they needed to make was just too big to consider.

How many of us have felt that way when a new challenge is before us, especially when the bridges behind seem to have collapsed and burned? It is said, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with one step." We either graduate (take a step *toward* something), or we dry out and cease to exist. Life is full of graduation or steps toward something. Each forward step leads us into God's forward-moving grace. It also means we move farther away from a previous starting point.

Think of the gap between starting kindergarten, junior high, and then high school. Look at the photos of yourself or your children. In some ways we want to be in a less complex time, but do we really want to live our lives as first graders, and would we want our children to stay there forever? Being single can be less complex; not having children can be less complex; not learning or being promoted can be less complex. Moving to a new town and school in the middle of high school can be complex and scary, but would we want to miss the blessings by avoiding stepping forward toward something? There is never a place where we can arrive, sit back, and feel safe from the fragileness and vulnerabilities of life. But we can step toward God's renewing grace and peace, and peace always happens in the context of relationship/s—always.

In Ezekiel's vison, God calls him to prophesy to the scattered bones (the discouraged, skeptical, broken people). Prophesy to the breath. The Hebrew word for breath in the original text is **"ruach,"** which is the same word for Spirit or **Holy Spirit.** (In the New Testament, the word for Holy Spirit is "pneuma," which also means breath or wind.)

"I prophesied just as I was commanded. There was a great noise as I was prophesying, then a great quaking, and the bones came together, bone by bone. When I looked, suddenly there were sinews on them. The flesh appeared, and then they were covered over with skin. But there was still no breath in them. He said to me, **'Prophesy to the breath**; prophesy, human one! **Say to the breath**, The Lord God proclaims: Come from the four winds, breath! Breathe into these dead bodies and let them live.' I prophesied just as he commanded me. When the breath entered them, they came to life and stood on their feet, an extraordinarily large company."

Listen to the "step forward to something," scattered bones are reconnected bone to bone, or rather a new structure is being built, things are coming together to frame out a new existence and support the next steps. Then sinews and muscles are placed on the new framework and finally skins to reveal these new bodies. But even though all of this important work has taken place, there is still not evidence of new life. The bodies are frozen and still not empowered.

God directs Ezekiel to call upon the "Breath" or Spirit again:

He said to me, "Human one, these bones are the entire house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope has perished. We are completely finished.' So now, prophesy and say to them, The Lord God proclaims: I'm opening your graves! I will raise you up from your graves, my people, and I will bring you to Israel's fertile land. You will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you up from your graves, my people. I will put my breath in you, and you will live. I will plant you on your fertile land, and you will know that I am the LORD. I've spoken, and I will do it. This is what the LORD says."

We thank Jesus, the Apostles, and all those who call upon the Holy Spirit to blow into our lives, communities, and all nations. Dear God, help us to raise our sails to catch the Spirit, and let it bring us together, connecting us with you and one another. Let us be built up where we need it most as individuals, communities, and nations. Remind us that healthy growth and empowerment begin when we acknowledge our complete dependence on you. Give us, Holy Spirit, power to recognize the difference between the spirits of chaos and destruction, which scatter us, and the Spirit of God, which builds confidence in power to make this world better than we found it. Help us to be honest with You, ourselves, and each other, for we truly do know the difference between that which is of You, O God, and that which leads to self-destruction. Help us this day to step forward in a new direction guided by the fresh air of your truth and power. Amen.

God loves us all with no take-backs! Pastor John

As CHILDREN DO

It has been a joy to dive more deeply into the Bethlehem community this month! Thank you for the ongoing welcome you have extended. Thank you for the May 21 welcome reception and the wonderful welcome basket, and thanks to those who helped me move! In the words of the Psalm, "My cup runneth over." Thank you.

I've been enriched by conversations with so many of you—at coffee shops, in the office, before and after worship, during ministry team meetings, while knitting, during youth group, and more! I continue to be inspired by your love for your faith, and by your commitment to bring love and beauty to our world.

On May 22-24, I attended the *Faith Forward* conference in Chicago. The focus of the conference was reimagining children's and youth ministry in the context of our changing world. Presenters focused on the premise that we are living in dangerous times and that the primary call of Christianity is for us to bring love into our world. The guiding question was: "How do we prepare children and youth to embody love and justice in our world?" While the focus was on working with youth and children, I came away with questions that apply to all of us: What spiritual practices best support us to go out into the world and love? What tools do we need in our spiritual toolkits to make us better at loving in our world? I look forward to conversations with you about these questions.

As I wrote last month, I believe spirituality is a living process. This month, I was encouraged by conversations and activities with the middle- and high-school youth about worship, faith, and spirituality. The conversations reinforced for me that spirituality is a lifelong journey and that we can practice our spirituality everywhere. I've also been reminded that, as with adults, children and youth can be supported by church and that they have important insights and gifts to offer when it comes to shaping what church is!

Jesus said, "Let the children come to me" and called us to receive the wonders of this life "as children do." As we support, and learn from, the children and youth in our lives, may we also nourish the childlike spirit *within* ourselves. Whitney Houston sang these words:

- I believe the children are our future.
- Teach them well and let them lead the way.
- Show them all the beauty they possess inside.
- Give them a sense of pride to make it easier.
- Let the children's laughter remind us how we used to be. —Whitney Houston, *The Greatest Love of All*

My wish for us this month is that we will encounter the fullness of life with hope for the future, with grounding in the present, with a sense of the wonders that surround us, and with resilient love for everyone.

Outreach Ministry Attends Food Gatherers Celebration

Bethlehem's Outreach Ministry Team recently attended the Food Gatherers Spring Reception and Gathering Awards Celebration. They met at Food Gatherers for their annual Spring Gathering event to learn more about our longtime partner in fighting hunger in our community. For many years Bethlehem UCC has supported Food Gatherers' efforts by collecting nonperishable food products and fresh produce on a regular basis to help keep the shelves of over 150 food pantries county-wide full for those facing food insecurity. Bethlehem members continue to contribute their time to food preparation, cooking, cleaning, and serving meals at the Community Kitchen/Delonis Center homeless shelter on the first Sunday afternoon each month. More recently, Bethlehem has nurtured a Faith and Food Garden at Bethlehem Cemetery, reaping even

more fresh produce for both Food Gatherers distributions and their meal programs at the Community Kitchen. Our Outreach Ministry Team members were impressed by not only the sheer scope of the Food

> Gatherers facility and operations (serving over 45,000 individuals annually) but also the diverse programming offered by the organization throughout Washtenaw County—from recognition of ethnic and special dietary food needs to summer feeding programs for

school children to the amount of data tracking necessary to continue the fight to alleviate hunger and eliminate its causes. Bethlehem UCC continues to partner with Food Gatherers in a variety of ways. If you are interested in joining those already volunteering, please check the bulletin board for current opportunities.



The Spring Gathering event offered tours of the Food Gatherers Warehouse, including presentations by staff and volunteers, up -close demonstrations of some of the processing of bulk produce, and information on the food education programming provided to staff and customers at local food pantry partners.


