Rev. John Kennedy

But Moses protested to God, "Who am I to appear before Pharaoh? Who am I to lead the people of Israel out of Egypt?" God answered, "I will be with you. And this is your sign that I am the one who has sent you: When you have brought the people out of Egypt, you will worship God at this very mountain."

—Exodus 3:11-12

Did you grow up hearing the story of Exodus? Many have—Jews, Christians, and anyone who has seen the 1956 movie *The Ten Commandments* by Cecil B. DeMille, starring Charlton Heston. As I remember this story of the mighty acts of God, I often am

drawn to the dramatic scenes: the Burning Bush; the parting of the Red Sea; the Egyptian chariots crushed beneath the falling waves; the pillar of fire guarding the Israelites; the rebellion of the Golden Calf; the gifts of water, manna, and quail.

In this epic story of the "Exodus," it is easy to overlook the many brave acts of faith that are happening in each woman, man, child, and family. It is easy to overlook the human limitations of the cast of characters, who get top billing. The doubts of the "ordinary" people are magnified, and the "strengths" of Moses, Jethro, Miriam, and Joshua are elevated. The reality is almost everyone is anxious, doubting, and fearful; and at the same time gifted with strengths, skills, and faith.



EXIT & ENTER

Among God's people there is a common vision to leave places that smother and crush life; and a hope to "enter" into a new place (the Promised Land) where life can thrive. Sometimes "exiting" (Exo-dus) a place that is smothering life is only part of the journey. The rest of the journey is "entering" into a new place of a promising future. Every time we enter into a new space, we are exiting another; and every time we exit a space we are entering another space. It is very hard to be fully present in two spaces at one time. Standing with one foot in one space, and the other foot in another area/space, leaves us neither fully here nor there.

When Moses is placed in a basket in the Nile River, he temporarily exits his life with the Hebrew slaves and becomes part of the House of Pharaoh (with all the privileges). Moses kills an Egyptian slave driver and exits Egypt and enters the life of the desert (for 40 years). God calls Moses to exit the life he has built in the desert (with his wife and children). He enters back into the court of Pharaoh and tells Pharaoh, "Let God's people go" [Hebrew lives matter].

Even though the people have a common goal they are complaining and blaming Moses: "this is harder

than we thought," "things are not happening fast enough," "maybe we should back off and see if Pharaoh will be nice to us if we stay," "things are only getting worse."

God has heard the people's cries, and he is still answering, saying perhaps, "Stay focused on the big vision, Struggle does not mean you are not moving forward. I sent you Moses (a murderer, a fugitive, a man of Egypt, a man of the Hebrews, a shepherd from the desert). Go forward! The exit is forward and outward, and the entrance is forward into the desert, and further on lies the Promised Land."

This is true today. The way to life often leads us to exit places of perceived safety and enter what seems risky and fraught with challenges. But this has always been true and always will be. Places in life that once seemed as a promised place can become places of bondage, and places that seem like unexplored deserts can reveal the Promised Land.

As I am writing, my old police partner Robby is telling me his mother, who is 93 years old and lives on the Texas coast, is trapped on land that has become an island surrounded by waves of water on all sides. So far, neither the Army, the Coast Guard, nor anyone else has been able to get close enough to help her. Her life depends on someone exiting a place of safety to bring her to a place of safety, food, and water. Ironic that a man who has saved many lives is now helpless and relying on others to enter the water to save her from tragedy. Sometimes the situations we enter into save not only the lives of others but us and our own loved ones, too.

Bethlehem UCC, will we enter a more Promised Land, even though it means exiting some things as we know them? The way of life is forward.

God loves us all with no take-backs!

FLU VACCINATION CLINIC - DATE CHANGE

Sunday, Oct. 1, 7:45 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.

ALERT: You need to sign up by SEPTEMBER 24 for the High-Dose Tri-valent vaccine (see below).



Evangelical Homes of Michigan will provide two types of vaccine: standard Tri-valent vaccine and high-dose Tri-valent vaccine.

The High-Dose Tri-valent contains 4 times the amount of antigen as the regular vaccine and is only approved for those 65 or older. Whereas it creates a stronger immune response, stronger side effects might occur.

A sign-up sheet is outside the office for those requesting the high-dose vaccine.

IMPORTANT POINTS

- It is essential that individuals desiring the High-Dose vaccine sign up by September 24 so that an adequate supply will be available. A sign-up sheet is outside the church office.
- Sign-up is not required for the Standard vaccine.
- Bring your Medicare or Medicare Advantage card.
- If you are not eligible for Medicare, a donation of \$15 is suggested; however, no one will be turned away for inability to pay.

Updates, changes, Friday Parking Lot Pretzels

First, and most important, we want to thank each and every one of you who have helped in any way to make Friday Parking Lot Pretzels so successful. We began this group in February 2011, and as we look forward to finishing our 7th year, we are very proud of what we have been able to accomplish. To date, we have raised \$59,525 in total profits,

which have all been earmarked for the General Fund of Bethlehem or to finance special projects, such as the 4th Avenue canopy, new lighting, the digital monitors, and repainting and recarpeting the elevator. In addition, the kitchen is maintained and upgraded as needed with these profits to meet health department requirements. We are indeed blessed to have had such a loyal, dedicated group of helpers who show up each month to share in the fellowship and fun of pretzel rolling. This ministry has flourished and grown, and many new friendships have developed. We make and usually sell out an average of 175 dozen (2,100 each) pretzels each month, and several times a year, we exceed 200 dozen

and a request for help!

in one month. So again, we simply say thank you!

Pretzel making is a 3-day process each month during pretzel week, and much work is done prior to the actual rolling on Friday. On Wednesday of pretzel week, supplies are purchased and brought to the church—and there are a lot of supplies needed for that many pretzels!

Dough making takes place on Thursday. This has required 3 people and takes about 4-5 hours. Also on Thursday, things are readied for rolling on Friday. There are a lot of "little" things that need to be done (blue trays need to have cloths put on them, racks and trays need to be put out, salt shakers filled, etc.). Until recently, all of this was done by the same people every month. Then, in late 2016, we asked people to help with the shopping, and Ron Karr and Scott & Kris Lovelace stepped up and have taken that on since November 2016. Patti Maki volunteered to come on Thursdays

to help do all the little things for Friday, which freed up an hour for the people making dough. Jan Burnham has been doing the laundry after the pretzel rolling for many months now, and we generate a lot of laundry, so we really appreciate this! These things alone have been such a huge help, and we are so grateful to these people for stepping up. Now we are asking you to seriously consider offering to help with the dough making and/or commit to staying on pretzel Fridays until all the bagging of the pretzels and the clean-up are totally done. There is so much work left to do after the rolling is finished, and much of the clean-up can't be done until the baking is over. Clean-up has usually been done by about 2:30 p.m. For several of us, our pretzel Fridays begin at 7 a.m., and we are there all day until the very end. We can't leave until everything is cleaned up and put away. Frankly, we are tired and need more help! So, after much thought, beginning in September 2017, we will limit our monthly production to 125 dozen. We think this is a realistic amount, but it will have some consequences, both good and bad. Our workload will be lightened, our time commitment will lessen, and we will not feel so "burned out" at the end of the day. However, our profits will definitely be impacted, and we will need to ask some of our customers who typically have had very large orders to limit them to a given number of dozen, which means some people who have ordered in the past might not be able to get their pretzels. In addition, we might have to curtail our practice of giving out pretzels to visitors at church on Sundays because we might not have extra pretzels for this purpose. This has been a difficult decision, but one we think will allow everyone to have more fun again instead of seeing pretzel production as a very long day of "work."

With all of this being said, we still need your help. Would you please consider helping make the dough on one or more Thursdays and/or staying to help clean up on one or more Fridays? You would not have to commit to helping every month, but if several people would help, we could share the duties so you might only have to help every other month or even less. Dough making is easy and repetitive, and it takes very little training. Since we will be making less dough now, the time to do so will decrease substantially. We know those people

who have always stayed to help with clean-up would like a break, too. We totally understand that everyone is busy and your time is valuable, but we also know that the great people of Bethlehem have always risen to the occasion when a need arises. We are seriously counting on you to do this now. We would need 1-2 people a month to help with making dough and 3-4 people to help clean up. We do not want to lose this valuable ministry, and we hope you will consider helping in either of these 2 areas. We have shared so much fun and fellowship with this ministry, and we would hate to lose it. We want all of you to join us and to continue to bring your friends! Please know that 60% of the profits each month will continue to fund special projects for which there has been no money budgeted, and we want to be able to continue funding these projects that will benefit our church and make it more welcoming. The other 40% will continue to go back into the general operating fund of the church. Following are the dates for September through December. Please plan to join us, and, if at all possible, please try to plan ahead so you will be able to be here for these dates, as the more people who can be there, the less time everything will take. Mark your calendars now and *please* let Paul or Barb Marshall know as soon as possible if you can help with either dough making or clean-up and the month(s) you can help. Thanks so much!

HOLY ROLLERS PRETZELS

As fall approaches, the Holy Rollers will celebrate their 11th anniversary as they resume making pretzels on Saturday, September 9. We would like to thank you for buying the pretzels that we make the second Saturday of most months. We began this project in September 2006. We are grateful for your support and want to update you on how we have chosen to use the money that has been raised. We reported to you in September 2014 how we have supported Bethlehem in various ways. Since then, we have donated a total of over \$28,000, most recently giving to the Steeple Bell Fund (\$2,000) and the Parsonage Renovation Fund (\$5,000). And did you know that we also make the pretzels used for Communion at Bethlehem?

Each time we make pretzels, we continue to set aside \$25 to pay for the Church World Service (CWS) kit processing and shipping. For each kit that we assemble and send to CWS, we are asked to send \$2/kit for processing. The Holy Rollers have raised a total of \$1,600 since 2010 for this purpose. Any additional money due CWS is covered by the Women of Bethlehem.

We will be rolling again on Saturday, September 9. You are welcome to join us.
