This is what the Lord says: "Stop at the crossroads and look around. Ask for the old, godly way, and walk in it. Travel its path, and you will find rest for your souls. But you reply, 'No, that's not the road we want!"" Jeremiah 6:16

The first book study I lead at Bethlehem in 2015 was "A Hidden Wholeness: The Journey toward an Undivided Life—Welcoming the Soul and Weaving Community in a Wounded World" by Dr. Parker Palmer. Parker Palmer is a well-known teacher and author who was greatly influenced by Henri Nouwen and Fr. Thomas Merton. These teachers are considered Christian Contemplatives (or Mystics) who focus on the needs of the human soul (and on this earth we are all embodied souls).

We travel this world created in the image of God and with human needs that are physical, emotional, relational, sexual, and spiritual. When one area of our life is wounded and hurting it affects the other areas of our lives. When certain areas of our lives experience grace or healing, we are led to feel more whole and centered.

Without a doubt we travel in our world aware of blessings, but we are also painfully aware of a divided and wounded world. In our life journeys, no one travels in a Disney-like escape from reality. Our Biblical heroes, prophets, disciples, and Jesus himself were blessed and yet painfully tormented by loneliness and tempted by the lure of the easy way out, and there are no shortcuts or "easy ways out."





From Your President's Desk...

My desk says, "Hello!" I say, "Let me update you with things I know..."

It's "old news," but the Congregational Meeting on April 15 heard Annual Report presentations and voted to authorize



spending up to \$30,000 to renovate the women's restroom across from the office.

A number of folks in leadership met in mid-April with Phoenix Construction, which is preparing a proposal to renovate the Willimann Fellowship Hall. The company alerted us to the possibility that the city may require a fire suppression system (not just an alarm system but sprinklers). Phoenix will present those plans to the city on May 4 for a decision. Stay tuned!

At its last meeting, Leadership Council established a "Rental Task Force" to recommend to Council ways to continue sharpening our rental policies and procedures, revisit our rates, and set long-term rental directions. We're doing very well in this area, and this "fine tuning" can only help.

Because I write this the first day of May and the *Visitor* doesn't come out until May 6, the Leadership Retreat on Saturday, May 5, will have already happened. I can't tell you here how it went, but know that Pastor John, Lily, and I planned what we feel is a good day with the theme "Possibilities and Opportunities."

Many of you may remember the lyrics, "Every form of refuge has its price" (The Eagles, "You Can't Hide Your Lying Eyes," 1974).

God created humans to need relationship—
relationship with God and with others. And not just
relationships, but healthy relationships. Without
relationships, no single human would come into existence or survive beyond one day without caring
relationships. No human is self-made or selfsustaining at all. But what helps make healthy relationships? How do we get to know our own souls
and the souls of others? How do we foster communities that are nurturing, creative, joyous, and safe
so we can find welcome for our souls, the souls of
others, weave community, and help be healed and
healers in a wounded world?

Parker Palmer has given us some helpful touchstones to remind us how to find our way back so that we can find our way forward:

Circles of Trust Touchstones

Extend and receive welcome. People learn best in hospitable spaces. In this circle, we support each other's learning by giving and receiving hospitality.

Be present as fully as possible. Be here with your doubts, fears, and failings as wells as your convictions, joys, and successes, your listening as well as your speaking.

What is offered in the circle is by invitation not demand. This is not a "share or die" event! During this retreat, do whatever your soul calls for, and know that you do it with our support. Your soul knows your needs better than we do.

Speak your truth in ways that respect other peo- ple's truth. Our views of reality may differ, but
speaking one's truth in a circle of trust does *not*mean interpreting, correcting, or debating what
others say. Speak from your center to the center of
the circle, using "I" **statements**, trusting people to
do their own sifting and winnowing.

No fixing, no saving, no advising, and no setting each other straight. This is one of the hardest guidelines for those of us in the helping professions. But it is one of the most vital rules if we wish to make a space that welcomes the soul, the inner teacher.

Learn to respond to others with honest, open questions instead of counsel or correction. With such questions, we help "hear each other into deeper speech."

When the going gets rough, turn to wonder. If you feel judgmental or defensive, ask yourself, "I wonder what might have brought her to this belief?" or "What is he feeling right now?" or "What does my reaction teach me about myself?" Set aside judgment to listen to others—and to yourself—more deeply.

Attend to your own inner teacher. We learn from others, of course. But as we explore poems, stories, questions, and silence in a circle of trust, we have a special opportunity to learn from within. So pay close attention to your own reactions and responses, to your most important teacher.

Trust and learn from silence. Silence is a gift in our noisy world and a way of knowing in itself. Treat silence as a member of the group. After someone has spoken, take time to reflect without immediately filling the space with words.

Observe deep confidentiality. Trust comes from knowing that group members honor confidences and take seriously the ethics of privacy and discretion.

Know that it's possible to leave the circle with whatever it was that you needed when you arrived. Know that the seeds planted here can keep growing in the days ahead.

Which of these touchstones are most important to you? How would you prioritize these touchstones to create Circles of Trust at Bethlehem UCC? Trust what your soul teaches you!

Then Jesus said, "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you. Let me teach you, because I am humble and gentle at heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy to bear, and the burden I give you is light." Matthew 11:28-30

I am interested in teaching this course once again. Interested? Please let me know.





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The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival

Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Matthew 25:37-40

Matthew 25:31-46 is often summarized as "The Judgment of the Nations." As Pastor John preaches, this scripture is about how nations (in Jesus' case, empires) treat people. In other words, this can be read as a verse that compels societies and governments to implement programs and structures that care for the "least of these" among us.

For most of my life, I understood the words attributed to Jesus in Matthew 25 as an individual imperative. That is, I, as an individual, must treat the oppressed in society with dignity; that I must take actions in my day-to-day life to show my care for the sick, the hungry, the imprisoned, the lonely, the poor, the hungry. I still believe this. I've also come to believe that the teachings of Jesus compel us to find ways to transform oppressive systems. The Poor People's Campaign is embodying the teachings of Jesus (and many other faiths) by professing in word and action that our nation can do right by the "least of these" and by inviting us all to be a part of making it so!

Led by Rev. Dr. William Barber and Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis, the Poor People's Campaign (PPC) is uniting people across political parties, issues, identities, faiths, and life experiences, to revive Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s, 1968 Poor People's Campaign. "We believe," the PPC's Covenant of Nonviolence reads, "that a moral revival is necessary to save the heart and soul of our democracy."

The Michigan Conference of the UCC has endorsed the Poor People's Campaign. On May 14, PPC is launching 40 days of "nonviolent moral fusion direct action" in cities across the country. This month, I invite you to join me in a faith-rooted exploration of the Poor People's Campaign. Details of the three-part series are printed below. Obviously, I'm a fan, but I'd like to learn with you and explore your questions.

Regardless of whether or not you join the course, I wish you the ongoing beauty and joy of daily actions that align with the prayer we say together each Sunday: "Thy kin-dom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven." As Jesus walked on this earth, he professed that another way of being in community was possible. Jesus preached that oppression and injustice can be transcended. I wish you the imagination and sense of possibility that Jesus embodied through his actions—to believe that we are "The Body of Christ"—that our actions do make a difference. I wish you the audacity to believe that the lowliest people in an oppressive empire—even an exiled baby born in a stable who became a man executed on a cross—can change the world. Our voices matter. Our actions matter. May we use them for Love.



The Poor People's Campaign:

A National Call for Moral Revival A Faith-Rooted Exploration



Planning Ahead for Summer! 2018 Bethlehem Church Tigers Outing, July 29



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
Veterans' Memorial Day Display


