We thank those who volunteered to help staff the parking lot during Art Fair—we took in \$2538! Add to that another \$900 the following Saturday when British soccer came to the Big House, and we're more than 50% of the way to the church's budgeted goal of \$6000 from parking.

We should know by the end of August how Phoenix Construction is doing getting bids based on the drawings the company shared with Leadership Council at our August meeting. (The drawings are on display in the Fellowship Hall.) An official letter to members announcing the meeting will be sent when the date is settled; the congregation will be presented with the drawings and the "bottom line" and then vote on accepting the Finance Ministry Team's funding proposal.

Part of this summer's Council work included a Pastoral review, as mandated by our bylaws. To improve this annual process for next year, we're studying a number of sources from the UCC, both nationally and regionally.

Service isn't a sacrifice or duty; it isn't simply a gift we bestow upon others. Service is an act of faith that enriches our lives. As St. Francis wrote in his Peace Prayer, "For it is in giving that we receive."

Here are just some of the service opportunities I am excited to engage in with you this fall:

The Auxiliary/Mother's Study Circle is continuing its beautiful tradition of making <u>Church World Service</u> (CWS) school and hygiene kits. In the *three weeks* since we announced this year's goal of 50 school kits and 100 hygiene kits, you have donated enough supplies to complete 41 school kits and 36 hygiene kits! Your generosity is beautiful, and I'm sure the numbers will grow again this Sunday and every Sunday until mid October when the kits are assembled. *More on page 8.*

The Education Ministry Team will engage Bethlehem's youngest members in local service projects throughout the year. The first is a complement to the Auxiliary/Mother's Study Circle CWS kits effort. In addition to gathering school supplies, we are hoping to collect 50 backpacks for local service agencies in time for our Blessing of the Backpacks on September 9. *More on pages 12-13.*

Members of the Youth Group will lead Bethlehem's participation in CWS Ann Arbor <u>CROP Walk</u> this September 30. You'll hear more about the goals for both walkers and fundraising in the weeks to come. At our kickoff meeting in September, we'll assemble snack bags to give to people who visit the church

Led by Auxiliary/Mother's Study Circle, we are again assembling CWS School and Hygiene Kits.


Led by youth, we're building a Bethlehem Team for the annual Ann Arbor CROP Walk, on Sunday, September 30!

Poor People's Campaign Info Sessions



UCC 101—November

As part of her ordination process, Lily completed a course titled "UCC History and Polity" through the Center for Progressive Renewal. This course will explore the history, theology, and structures of the United Church of Christ. We'll talk about how Bethlehem relates to the UCC and how the UCC is exploring the future of church in our world. We'll have opportunities to discuss what it all means to you on your personal faith journey!

Yoga for Beginners

As part of my Yoga Teacher Training, I'll be offering a 5-week yoga class in October and November.



CLINICAL PASTORAL EDUCATION

As Pastor John announced in church on August 13, I will be completing 1 unit of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) at Michigan Medicine from September-December. This Internship is a requirement for ordination in the Michigan Conference of the UCC, and in many denominations.

CPE is a form of experiential theological education that "takes place not exclusively in academic classrooms, but also in clinical settings where ministry is being practiced."* I'll be one of four "Interns" completing the part-time Level I unit of CPE. The 16-week program involves both classroom learning and hands-on chaplaincy training.

I would appreciate your thoughts and prayers as I embark on this training and learning opportunity. I am grateful to Pastor John, the Leadership Council, and the entire Bethlehem community for your support as I continue the ordination process. Funeral Luncheon Help Needed

A very meaningful ministry that women in our congregation have provided are funeral luncheons for families of our active membership at the time of the death of a loved one.

A Funeral Luncheon Coordinator works with church staff and the family to determine what food will be served at the luncheon. The coordinator also recruits volunteers from a provided database to help with setup, serving, and providing some of the food.

We have reached a point where we are very much in need of additional people who would be willing to be a <u>coordinator</u>. We currently have four women who are coordinators, but there are times when no one is available. We would like to increase the number of coordinators to provide this leadership more consistently.

Thanks to Barb Fisher and Marian Caswell, who were our coordinators for many years, we have information and guidelines for organizing the funeral luncheons. And, of course, current coordinators are happy to share their experiences.

News from Bethlehem Cemetery



Bethlehem Cemetery continues to catch up with maintenance and make improvements. If you have visited the cemetery lately, you will notice we have changed the signs within the cemetery to make them more readable and more attractive. Much of that work has been done by Jim and Sallie Stadel and Jim Lutz. Jim and Sallie Stadel also took down and refurbished the "Bethlehem Cemetery" sign made by Gert Eisele's now deceased husband. This beautiful sign is back in its place at the entrance.

Cemetery Board members and some of their spouses painted the windows and doors on the building a complementary shade to match the building's rocks (not the pink that Marilyn Pearson accidentally chose before she left for the winter two years ago that shocked her when she arrived home in the spring.)

We will be purchasing trees and planting them this autumn. A shrub near the front corner of the building would be a nice addition to the landscape.

The memorial garden at the back of the cemetery where the Easter Sunrise service has been held the past few years will undergo a facelift. We plan to make space for two granite benches that any patron might like to donate to the cemetery. We will add some perennials on the inside of the garden around the circle and along an outside border to give the garden a lift. The garden has good "bones"; it just needs redefinition.

As one can see, we will make good use of the Mother's Day donations given this spring, but we can use more donations to complete our improvements.

News from the **Education Ministry Team**

Welcome-Back Sunday

the backpacks of our youth and for those we will be donating to youth who need them. (See page 13 for more details)



Youth can then go

to Sunday school if they choose. At the Coffee Connection following the service, we will celebrate with Washtenaw Dairy donuts.

Youth Mission Projects

Each year we choose a youth mission project. Our youth help select the projects and then throughout the year we have various collections and fundraisers supported by the whole church.

Our 2017–18 project was to work with the Ruth Ellis Center, which helps LGBTQ youth. We had a successful clothing drive during Advent when we filled a minivan with clothes. During Lent, we collected grab -'n'-go foods. We collected money throughout the year, and the Palm Sunday brunch donations went into this fund. This summer, we mailed a check for \$2000 to the Ruth Ellis Center. We also contributed locally to Ozone House, whose work is similar to that of Ruth Ellis. They were both very grateful. Thank you to our youth for organizing this and to all in the congregation who contributed.

This year's mission project will entail learning more about the *Poor People's Campaign*. This campaign started in the '60s with the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and is being revived. Lily Tinker Fortel held a series of talks about it last year and many of our members attended. Roy Muir was one of those who attended Lily's classes. At the Outreach Ministry

Team (OMT) Roy discussed some of what he learned and what he knew about local poverty. It is remarkable that in a city and county as ours, with so many resources and such abundance, there are many people, families, and children who live below the poverty line. What are the needs of our poorest neighbors? How can we, as a church, help?

Roy brought up these questions at the OMT meeting: "How can we at Bethlehem and OMT explore more about poverty in Washtenaw County? What things can we learn from the Poor People's Campaign and make a difference?" He brought this challenge to those of us on OMT, and we explored what some of the steps might be.

After consulting with the youth, we have chosen the theme of the mission project this year to be learning more about the Poor People's Campaign. We will ex-



plore the chalfor us. The youth will then choose fund drives and projects to help

the poor among us. Lily will continue education for our youth in Sunday school and in Children's Moments to help us all learn more about the Poor People's Campaign. She is also going to have more educational events open to the whole congregation throughout this year as part of her role as our Minister of Spiritual Growth and Development.

The Outreach Ministry Team (OMT) will continue its core commitments working with those in need. OMT has chosen to focus on Alpha House, the Washtenaw Shelter Association, Peace Neighborhood Center, and CROP Walk. We also have the Auxiliary/Mother's Study Circle, which contributes to projects and puts together the Church World Service Health Kits and School Kits. We believe together (our youth and our congregation) we can do more, so the youth will try to pick projects that will support these other missions of our church in line with the Poor People's Campaign.

News from the Education Ministry Team

Our first project is collecting school supplies and backpacks for Sunday, Sept. 9.



Our goal is at least 50 backpacks! Please drop off backpacks at the office or bring to church on Sundays.

They will be distributed to Peace Neighborhood Center and Ozone

House. We will also be collecting school supplies. The school supplies can be any school supplies you choose. If they are ones on the list for the Church World Service kits (pencils, spiral notebooks, scissors, 24-count crayons, etc.), we will donate them to this cause. If you bring other supplies, we will donate them to Peace Neighborhood and Ozone House. They need donations throughout the year, but the fall is especially important as children head back to school. Please be generous.

The Lois's Corner Project

Lois Haeussler was a beloved member of Bethlehem for many years. She was the church-school secretary and kept our Sunday school in order. Among other things, she went to our classrooms each week and collected the children's offerings and kept attendance. As she did this, she became known to generations of Bethlehem children. In her estate, money was left to the Education Ministry Team. After much deliberation, the EMT has chosen to create a space we will call Lois's Corner that will be in the back of the sanctuary underneath the balcony. We brought the project to the Leadership Council, and it was approved.

We worked with an interior designer, and the project will be unfolding this fall after we are able to purchase the furniture and carpet. The furniture will be Amish oak furniture that will be stained to match the oak of our pews. There will be a beautiful, durable soft carpet to define the space. We will have a small amount of oak chairs with soft cushions, two gliders, two oak side tables, two oak bookshelves, and two small oak children's tables with chairs.



We hope to create a warm, calm space where individuals and families can sit and still be part of the worship service. In Matthew 19:14, Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." With the generosity of Lois Haeussler, we will create a space that will indeed let the children come.
