November provides an opportunity to reflect on the things for which we are grateful. As always, our lives are full. Life brings ups and downs, tragedies and triumphs. Our faith reminds us that we are embraced and loved in the fullness of our humanity.

In November, I invite you into a daily gratitude practice. Take a few minutes each day to write down two or three things for which you are grateful. If you have an existing daily prayer or devotional practice, you could incorporate this. If you've been wanting to renew or begin a daily practice, this could be a good place to start. Studies have found a correlation between giving thanks and improved well-being (https://www.health.harvard.edu/healthbeat/giving-thanks-can-make-you-happier).

On November 21 at 3 p.m., we'll have the opportunity to reflect on our gratitude journeys with one another.

Our faith also invites us to give joyfully for the well-being of others and realization of Heaven on Earth. I find that my giving is all the more joyful when it is rooted in gratitude for what I have received. This November and December, we will have many opportunities for giving at Bethlehem. In November, we'll collect supplies for Church World Service school and hygiene kits. The United Church of Christ is leading a denomination-wide "Giving Tuesday" fundraiser on December 3, which will help alleviate medical debt for families. Throughout December, we'll collect hats, mittens,





2019-2020 Mission Project

Announcing the Educational Ministry Team's 2019-2020 Mission Project: Easy Water for Everyone.

Curing disease from drinking infected water in poor villages in Ghana, Africa

I recently traveled to Ghanaian villages by the large Volta River, where infected drinking water causes diarrhea and other sickness. These illnesses can lead to deaths in children. Being a nephrologist (kidney doctor), I know that dialysis filters do not allow bacteria or viruses to get across the filter membrane. As a board member of the charity "Easy Water for Everyone," I visited Ghana for the installation of devices that use dialysis filters to provide whole villages with clean drinking water. I helped analyze monthly recordings of diarrhea in four villages during the months before and after initiation of the Easy Water device. The results were dramatic: The occurrence (incidence) of diarrhea was suddenly reduced by an average of 70%, while no such change was observed during the same months in villages without this device.

Our group reported these findings at several international meetings and published a scientific paper. Our hope is that this proven success will allow a big expansion to many more villages in Africa through an increase in financial support. In Ghana, 17 villages with no electricity now have clean and uninfected water through the Easy Water devices with dialysis filters.

Bethlehem's Education Ministry Team has identified Easy Water for Everyone as the 2019-2020 Service Project. We will also identify an agency/organization that works to ensure our local and regional water is protected. In the New Year, we will have opportunities to learn more about Easy Water for Everyone and support the amazing work the organization does. In the meantime, you can learn more at


