## "Walking with Jesus: A Lenten Journey 2020" by Rev. John Kennedy

"Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. The tempter came and said to him, "Since you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." But he answered, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." - Matthew 4:1-4

The story of Jesus' "Temptation in the Wilderness", raises many troublesome questions. Why would a good God intentionally tempt and test anyone? Since God, is a good and gracious God, why is evil and suffering even allowed to exist? The "Journey of Life" is already challenging enough (pain, hunger, illness, violence, and grief) without cosmic forces subjecting humans to a "game of chance" while observers cast bets on who will be the survivor. The question of "Why would a good God permit the existence of evil" has been asked since the beginning of the human experience and is called the "Theodicy".

"As defined by theologian Dr. Alvin Plantinga, "Theodicy" is the "the question of why God permits evil". Theodicy is defined as a theological construct that attempts to vindicate God in response to the evidential problem of evil that seems inconsistent with the existence of an omnipotent and omnibenevolent deity. Another definition of theodicy is the vindication of divine goodness and providence in view of the existence of evil. The word theodicy derives from the Greek words Θεός Theos and δίκη dikē. Theos is translated "God" and dikē can be translated as either "trial" or "judgement". Thus, theodicy literally means "justifying God". There is a story, where the question is turned upside down. A person asks God, why do you allow suffering, and God responds, "I was going to ask you the same thing, why do you (humans) allow suffering?" (continued on page 2)

Every week, I walk with people who are in pain, crises, or grieving. Death, illness, divorce, the loss of an occupation, or a betrayal affects us all. When I am asked this question, my response is, "I don't have answers, I can only share my ongoing journey and lived experience". I can tell you what I hold onto in fail and yet, that faith is constantly be challenged and lived day to day.

Experiencing pain and suffering is natural and it is so human to ask "when will the hurting stop" or "why did God do this?". The are many forms of wellness and suffering. Physiologically, we are hard-wired to experience pain and pleasure, hunger and fullness, fatigue and rest, danger and safety, illness and wellness. No one lives a human experience without these responses, they are what help us survive. We are heathier when we listen to our bodies. The very systems that help us experience "well-being" are the same systems that alert us to something "bad" happening. Pain is an alarm that alerts us to pay attention.

But what about emotional and spiritual pain or well-being? I believe that there are hard-wired spiritual experiences that are connected. When I am with someone who is dying it seems that all of the physical and earthly concerns seem to fade away and other deeper spiritual struggles surface; struggles that go deeper even than emotions, such as; shame/grace, guilt/forgiveness, grief/comfort, feeling unworthy/unconditional love, betrayal/loyalty, ambiguity about death/resurrection, separation/connection, and especially abandonment/ embrace. These spiritual struggles are not a sign of a lack of faith, but rather the life and struggle of faith. These forms of spiritual pain happen because we are wired to; love, trust, forgive, accept grace, and embrace hope.

In the story of the wilderness, God in Christ, comes near, and shares our human experience fully. Jesus does not escape pain, hunger, or temptation to use his gifts for selfish purposes. Jesus does not fight off those temptations but let's go and grabs onto to something else, someone else. Jesus, in faith, trusts that he has not been abandoned, and that God has walked with him into, through, and out of the wilderness. He trusts that God does not tempt or test, but rather gives us strength, and reminds us of God's true nature. God has created life in such a way that life defeats death. That love, grace and forgiveness are more powerful than any other resource, and that they are always there for us no matter where our journey leads.

God loves us all with no take-backs!



## **2020 Lenten Service Projects**

This year's project is two-fold and will benefit two organizations:

- 1. Easy Water for Everyone: "We believe that every human being deserves lasting access to safe water and sanitation — spending more time learning, growing, working, and thriving, instead of walking for water and fighting off illness."
  - · The Education Ministry Team (EMT) is leading this effort. BUCC member Dr. Fritz Port is on the Board of Directors.
    - · Bethlehem's children and youth will collect your loose change during Sunday services in Lent. EMT will sell St. Patrick's Day cookies on Sunday, March 15. Fellowship MT will collect donations at the Palm Sunday Brunch.
    - · Youth Group: Come to board game night on 3/12 (any donations will go to the project).
    - · Optional donations will be collected during Gentle Yoga in Lent
  - · Goal: Raise \$3,200 to fully fund the installation of one water filtration system and maintain it for five years. As of Saturday, 2/29/2020, we have raised \$881 toward our goal.
- 2. Habitat for Humanity of Genesee County. For the last several years, Bethlehem's annual summer mission trip has involved service with Habitat of Genesee County in Flint. This year, our summer service trip will take place with a UCC church in Cincinnati, OH, but we are continuing to support Habitat of Genesee County in this way.
  - · Folks who have participated in the Habitat trips are leading the way on this effort! · Sign up for a Lent Build 2020 packet with Lily. You'll receive a cardboard Habitat house piggy bank, and the calendar with 40 days of devotional material. The calendar is also printed in this bulletin.
  - · Participate as you choose. You may follow the donation prompts for each day during Lent, or make a one time donation. On Easter Sunday, bring your "house" to Bethlehem so we can build our Bethlehem Builds village!
  - · Goals: Raise \$1,000 and have 75 participating Bethlehem members.

Any level of participation is appreciated! We'll celebrate our progress on both projects during Sunday services. Thank you in advance for contributing to this shared Lenten spiritual practice at Bethlehem. Whatever your Lenten practices involve, we wish you a meaningful and reflective Lenten season.






