Leaders, Looking for God's Light

Elijah and Elisha had stopped at the Jordan. Elijah took his cloak, rolled it up and struck the water with it. The water divided to the right and to the left, and the two of them crossed over on dry ground. When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me, what can I do for you before I am taken from you?" "Let me inherit a double portion of your spirit," Elisha replied. "You have asked a difficult thing," Elijah said, "yet if you see me when I am taken from you, it will be yours—otherwise, it will not." - 2 Kings 2: 8-10

In this story Elijah and Elisha are standing at the River Jordan, and Elijah is about to ascend into heaven in a chariot of fire and light. Elijah is considered the greatest of all prophets, and his understudy Elisha will be left to be a prophet in Elijah's absence. How will Elisha fill Elijah's shoes and do the work that needs to be done on behalf of God as a prophet. Elisha asks Elijah, for a double-portion of God's spirit to guide and fortify him. Elisha will now have to be God's prophet to the leaders/kings of Israel.

Prophets have a tough role because they always have to deliver hard messages. Seldom are God's messengers fully embraced by God's own people, until after they are gone. In the Bible, prophets like Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Elijah speak words meant to open our eyes, awaken us and guide us into God's light. Now it will be Elisha's turn and he needs a double-portion of God's light to do so.

In all times, God finds prophets among us, people who are imperfect but who are willing to be open to God for wisdom and light. Each messenger is a flesh and blood human just like you. In fact, it could be you! To be God's messengers, we have to be open and willing enough to be guided unto the path where God's light is shining and not unto our own path. Jesus said that sometimes even our own families will not understand why we are on a path that seems to lead away from their path. Even wonderful people and nations can find themselves on a wrong path but who will lead them/us back to a healthier one.

There are still prophets among us if we look. I believe Dr. Fauci has done the work of a prophet. Israel just awarded Dr. Fauci an award with 1-million dollars for “Speaking Truth to Power, Amid the Pandemic”. It is not enough to see God’s light- we have to reflect and shine that light that we have not hidden under a bushel. This reminds me of a quote by Leslie Fieger, “Any fool can run towards the light. It takes a master with courage to turn and face the darkness and shine her/his own light into the darkness”.

Darkness and evil can be subversive and tricky and even present itself as light to Godly people. During WW 2, millions of German Christians ignored Rev. Dietrich Bonhoeffer’s prophetic words while following Hitler into the darkness and destruction. God did not turn God’s back to the people, the people turned their backs to God’s light.

Like Elisha, we need a double –portion of God’s light and spirit, perhaps even a triple-portion to shine light into our times. The more we are willing to be agents and messengers of light, the more God will grant us God’s spirit to face our times. I invite all of us this Lenten season to open ourselves to God’s light and ask for a triple-potion of God’s spirit. We don’t need to change anyone, we just need to shine our light with compassion and courage, wherever you are or go. This little light of mine, I’m gonna let it shine.

God loves us all with no take-backs!

Looking for Light



Our worship theme this year is “Looking for Light”. The last 12-14 months have been difficult for all of us, but in different ways. On top of the pandemic we have been trying to find our way through racial injustice, political divide, economic uncertainty, hunger, grief, loneliness, loss of “normal”, climate and weather disasters. I find myself thinking, it must get better from here, right? And then another news story breaks. As the

Worship Ministry Team prepared for our Lenten services, we read the Scriptures and prayerfully discerned how to make this season meaningful to our members. While we considered many options, we all gravitated towards the theme of light. We felt that what our community needs most is the light to help guide us out of the darkness.

What has created darkness in your life? If you have come out of darkness previously, what light were you able to follow? What did you learn from a previous crisis that can pull you or someone you love out this time? We will be exploring these ideas through Lent and we welcome conversation with you. As you experience Lent and the messages from our Scripture lessons, I pray that it calls us to recognize our dark places but also the light around us. It could be a friend checking in, a walk outside in the sun, our children or pets counting on us, a new skill learned, one more day sober, a win at work, a nurse knowing what you need before having to ask, a creative project that brings a moment of joy. It doesn’t have to be bright like the sun or explosive like fireworks. Sometimes it’s small like a candle. That could be all you need to retrieve something you lost, to see yourself in the mirror, or to find your way out.

In addition to Sunday services, we hope you will consider joining us for Roundtable Pulpit Tuesdays, Antiracism Discussion Group on Wednesdays, Fellowship Hour on Sundays, Happy Hour 2nd & 4th Wednesdays, or Yoga on Tuesdays. Connecting with others during this period of extended limitations may be that candle in the window to light your way.

While I certainly wish Pastor Lily well, wherever her ministry takes her, I’ll certainly miss her intellect, enthusiasm, and cheerfulness. There is never a perfect time to end a ministry: contemplated action, things in motion, things only dreamt of: the inbox is never empty! I can only imagine how difficult making this decision must have been.

Now is the time we need to remind ourselves the church is not one person (well, except our Lord and Savior!) This is not the end of the story, as our denomination likes to remind us: “God is still speaking.”

The path forward is (never) completely clear. Certainly, the Leadership Council meeting this month will focus on this change and how to meet it.

At a time like this, it is important to face this loss, celebrate Pastor Lily’s unique contributions to our church’s story, pray, and think clearly about how to proceed. While there is no right answer, wrong ones abound, include yielding to despair, turning away or rushing to fill the void as quickly as possible.

In the coming while, I encourage you to share your thoughts, feeling, and hopes: we are a community and need to listen to and support one another at all time, especially now.

We Would Like Your Help!

Dear BUCC Members and Visitors,

Are you missing in-person church services and celebrations? For many, if not all of us, this past year has presented many challenges. The BUCC Covid-19 task force (Pastors John and Lily, Julie-Parish Administrator, myself) has been monitoring the pandemic spread and national, state and local restrictions and recommendations since the beginning. At the beginning of this pandemic the decision was made by our Leadership Council with input from our ministry teams and some church members to close our building, moving all services to online, in an effort to avoid spreading of the virus. Although this decision was difficult, in our opinion it was correct.

The development and distribution of multiple vaccines allows all of us to be hopeful. Hopeful that soon, we may reach a point where we will be allowed to worship together to share in-person church activities. All of us on the task force have heard the question "when will Bethlehem open for in-person services?" At present, state restrictions prevent in-person, non-family, indoor gatherings. Our task force is working on recommendations for a safe re-opening when state and national restrictions allow.

To assist our efforts, we would like to survey our congregation to understand your interest for in-person services and develop a snapshot of our current congregation-wide vaccination status. Listed below is a link to a short survey. You do not need to provide your name when completing this survey. Your responses will be confidential although we will summarize the results and send those aggregated results back to our congregation. The link will remain active until March 6th.

To be remedied as quickly as possible? I challenge you to take pride in spending time alone with our God, perhaps being carried by Him if needed. Maybe it is during your lunchtime walk. Maybe it is after tucking in your loved ones for the night. Maybe it is after you have rushed outside with wet hair and noticed ice crystals form. Be alone sometimes in the beautiful world God created for us.



YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY TEAM

Warm Greetings from the Youth and Young Adult Ministry Team! The Youth and Young Adult Ministry Team has been busy finding creative ways to connect and engage our youth during the past months. Here's what we've been up to.

Gatherings: Lots of ZOOM! When COVID first hit, youth were in the middle of confirmation and this was continued virtually. During the summer, zoom YOUTH GROUP happened every few weeks and every two weeks in the fall. The highlight of the fall was our IN PERSON masked and socially distanced HALLOWEEN PARTY. We met in the church yard for games, prizes, and a fire pit.

BUCculeles: We started a UKULELE BAND open to all Bethlehem Youth and Adults! Ukuleles were provided to all youth. Our youth and college age musicians collaborated in the initial planning and leadership, creating weekly instructional videos and zoom sessions. Weekly JAM SESSIONS are ongoing.


Deliveries: To show our youth that their church loves them, we made various deliveries including summer WATER BALLOONS, Halloween SPINYATAS (a kind of pinyata that spins, spewing candy and providing a fun alternative to trick-or-treating!), chocolate ADVENT CALENDARS, BUCculele SONGBOOKS, Exploration Curriculum and Faithful Families Advent BOOKS, and CHRISTMAS EVE KITS with glow stick candles, hot chocolate, and a toy. Mailings included postcards and letters from Pastor Lily, and Christmas ornaments and crafts from the Education Ministry Team.

Worship: We strive to integrate the youth into every aspect of church life, and they have contributed to our worship videos in many ways. They have been LITURGISTS, and have made MUSICAL contributions and OUTREACH announcements. They have provided LEADERSHIP in the MOTHER'S DAY service, on CONFIRMATION SUNDAY, and in the BLESSING OF THE BACKPACKS service. We have learned from them as they and their mentors shared with us the confirmation journey they experienced together, and as they shared their school experiences during COVID.

Check-Ins: Youth were asked for feedback on scheduling and programming for Fall 2020. Pastor Lily checks in with the Youth Group members by email and text, and has offered her availability as a resource as needed.



Your Facilities Ministry Team at Work!

As you are aware, since March 2020 (Covid19) our Bethlehem building is being used on a limited basis. This use includes office operations, the U of M nurses conducting a medical study with a limited registered group and a small Groundcover staff using the room in the lower level. Groundcover vendors pick up papers and are given clothing/supplies outside the 5th Ave door area. Both groups sanitize their indoor areas daily.

We are grateful to the facility team members and volunteers that have done daily walkthroughs to make sure the building is secure and identify any maintenance or repair concerns.

Some of those concerns have included leaky steam pipes, a radiator leak in the sanctuary and plumbing issues. Other items were thermostats that had to be calibrated and/or replaced, various lights inside and outdoors replaced, electrical switches replaced, repair of a leaky boiler condensation pump, faulty office AC, air circulation unit replaced and identified a foundation leak under the south exit by the fellowship hall. The heating system in the fellowship hall is not functioning properly. CMR, the installer, is working to get this corrected.

Both parsonages required some repairs/upgrades including a new furnace/hot water heater in the 4th Ave parsonage as well as electrical repair, a storm door replaced and the front steps replaced.

Roof

Grunwell & Cashero repaired several areas of failed stone/mortar on the 1895 building that were identified last spring. These areas directly impact the sanctuary and were critical to preserving it. We also had Butcher and Butcher repair areas on the roof connecting stone/tiles/downspouts/scupper boxes on the south side of the sanctuary and between the sanctuary and 1933 building. Due to the weather, they will return in the spring.

Even though building usage has been limited and worship/meetings postponed, our beautiful building continues to need care.

We thank the congregation for your support and gracious donations to the Property Improvement fund.
