

From Your President's Desk As this Visitor deadline approaches on March 15, I see that a year ago we were just beginning to grapple with how the Covid virus was going to affect Bethlehem church. It all seems so long ago, made doubly so by our having been physically apart from one another and from worshiping together in our church building during that year.

My Presidential article in the last March's Visitor had no hint of what was to come: it concentrated on our marking Pastor Kennedy's five-year anniversary at BUCC, the pie celebration in Fellowship Hall and the official Pastoral photograph added to our gallery: still smiling down, awaiting passing congregants.

I see a webcast on my calendar from this time last year, "How to do church online in this time of Covid." We've all gained practical experience on that topic this year and in some ways, I think we're better for it.

Fiscally, we've "keep the faith." The 9 month report from our Financial Administrator shows our total income is almost 5% <u>ahead</u> of the three-quarter mark and our total expenditures are more than 4% below that same mark. (Keep in mind we are operating under a "bare bones" budget, but still have many fixed expenses.)

Last week, the Leadership Council sent all members a mailing announcing the beginning of our Financial Campaign for Fiscal 2022. A graph based on numbers prepared by a Task Force charged with looking at the next five year painted a pretty dismal picture of where we're headed, if we continue to balance deficit budgets using our investment funds. We're not the government: we can't print money!

After we gather input for the next fiscal year from the various groups appearing in our budget, we'll share a summary of that information to show the goals BUCC leadership has set to help inform your pledge to fund that journey. Expect pie! (Well, a pie chart, showing the budget breakdown.)

As we move through Lent toward Easter with plans of an in-person early morning service, please reflect on what Bethlehem church means to you and how best you can support her.


We are so excited to offer a live worship service at the Bethlehem Cemetery at 8:00 a.m. on Easter Sunday! This will be our first live worship in over one year. We anticipate the Holy Spirit blowing through our midst as we gather to celebrate Christ's resurrection in the beauty of these hallowed grounds. Please contact the church office if you plan to attend this service so that we know what size tent to rent and how many chairs we will need. Our pre-recorded Easter service premieres at 10 a.m. and will be available for viewing anytime afterwards.

On Easter morning we hear the story of Mary Magdalene coming to Jesus' tomb before dawn and discovering that the stone had been rolled away from its entrance. She runs to the disciples for help searching for Jesus. The disciples explore the empty tomb and find Jesus' linen wrappings, but not his body. As Mary looks inside the cave, she sees two angels who ask her why she is weeping. Then she turns and sees Jesus in bodily form, but does not recognize him, until he speaks her name. Mary was searching for a dead body, but she discovers that Jesus is very much alive. Her expectations were exceeded beyond her wildest imagination.

As we too search for Jesus, looking for His Light and praying for His presence, let us open our hearts and minds to God's imagination and answers beyond what we dare to hope. When we hear Jesus calling our name, perhaps we can discover new pathways and opportunities and strength for our challenges. Jesus is present among us. Jesus promises us new life and abundant love. Jesus offers healing and restoration. We can't know for sure what will happen to our souls after we leave our mortal bodies, but we can lean on the promises of Jesus that in heaven there are many rooms and that He goes to prepare a place for us. Jesus is alive!

During this Easter season as Spring is about to burst forth in all its glory, we pray that the light of Christ will continue to burst forth and shine brilliantly through us, within us, and as a glowing beacon to guide us through the darkness we will face on our journey. BUCC Covid-19 Survey Results

Last month our task force sent out a brief three question survey to gain more insight into the vaccination status of the congregation along with your opinions on opening the church. That survey was recently closed and the summarized results are presented below.

Looking Back:


It is almost incomprehensible that a year has passed since we last met in-person to worship together. I remember vividly the impromptu church meeting where those present discussed the emerging COVID 19 pandemic. At that time, all schools were open and there were only a handful of people in Washtenaw County who had contracted the virus. We debated and discussed criteria that we might use to determine when the appropriate time would be to suspend all indoor church activities. At the conclusion of the meeting, the group settled on two markers that would be used to trigger the closing of our church. If either the Ann Arbor Public Schools (AAPS) closed or a member of our congregation contracted the virus then our Leadership Council, with the support of Pastor John and Pastor Lily, would close the church for in-person services and activities. The very next day, AAPS announced that they were immediately closing all public schools in Ann Arbor. Our leadership followed by suspending all activities to protect our congregation from potential spread of this new virus. That decision, in the short term resulted in our church staff working from home and our renters (Groundcover, UM School of Nursing, Ann Arbor Youth Choir) losing access to our building.

As the pandemic progressed, our Leadership Council established the BUCC COVID 19 task force and charged the task force with developing and presenting recommendations for our church. The task force (composed of Pastors John and Lily, Julie our Parish Administrator and myself) began to review every recommendation, guideline, and restriction that came from the CDC, our state and local health departments. We were able to recommend targeted activities within the church building by various groups provided each group met the mitigation requirements. At the appropriate time, Groundcover and School of Nursing partners began modified activities within the building. In addition, our facilities team and staff also implemented modified activities. I am impressed with the response from these groups to each and every recommendation / restriction that rolled out over the past year. Julie, Pastors John and Lily supported these efforts and educated all staff members and visitors that came into our building. In addition, Tom Ziesemer and the Facilities Ministry Team provided daily building inspections and coordination with contractors to address our building needs while meeting all recommendations. I find it a testament to the efforts of all (Staff, Leadership, Facilities, volunteers and renters) that we have been able to maintain reduced but continuous indoor activities without incident. I know of no known cases of viral transmission associated with any of these activities to date.

Looking ahead:

As we see the roll-out for the approved vaccines, it seems reasonable to begin to see a path forward to the return of in-person services. That was the reasoning behind the distribution of the church survey last month. I am pleased to say that the response from the congregation to this survey was substantial. I received 73 responses from our church members, below are the responses.

Question 1: Do you feel now is the time to open in-person services at Bethlehem? 72 responses



As shown, twenty-five percent of those who responded felt that now is the time to re-open our building. In contrast, 75% felt it was either not the time or they were unsure/undecided. Although right now may not be the correct time to re-open, we can appreciate the desire to re-open as soon as it is safe.

In our second question, we asked if you would be interested in returning once the Governor relaxed the indoor gathering restrictions (currently in place). Your responses are summarized in the next pie chart.

Question 2: Would you be willing to attend in-person church worship when allowed? 73 responses




Seventy-one percent indicated they would be willing to return to indoor, in-person services provided appropriate mitigation steps were in place or respondents would return with no specific concerns. This suggests that we should begin to think what returning to in-person services would look like. Our task force is in the process of developing these recommendations for submission to Leadership Council. We will submit those, based upon current recommendations and restrictions, once the indoor gathering restriction is lifted to a level that would support an inperson worship service. Once those are approved, the expectations for everyone attending a service will be communicated to all of our congregation.

Good News:

The last question in our survey asked how many adults in your household have received at least their first vaccine injection. The summary answers are provided in the last pie chart.

Question 3: How many adults in your family unit have received at least one dose of the vaccine. 73 responses



The good news is that approximately 72% of respondents indicated that one or more adults have started or completed their vaccination journey. As the vaccines become more readily available, this number will increase.

We are coming out of the long darkness together. So many people have been working diligently to keep everyone safe and protected. Their efforts have allowed us to continue to safely record and deliver our Sunday services, be open to our rental partners, maintain our aging but beautiful infrastructure and be in a position to return to inperson worship in the near future.



COVID-19 Vaccine Eligibility Requirements:

Beginning Monday, March 8, individuals age 50 and older who are living with a disability or with COPD, hypertension, chronic kidney disease, heart disease, diabetes, obesity or other conditions that put them at high risk of negative COVID-19 outcomes, are eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine in Michigan. Caregiver family members and guardians age 16 years and older of children with special health-care needs are also eligible.



Beginning Monday, March 22, all patients age 50 and older will also be eligible for vaccination, as supply allows.

MICHIGAN MEDICINE PATIENTS:

If you are an established Michigan Medicine patient and meet the state's criteria for vaccination eligibility, you are automatically enrolled in our vaccination program. No sign-up or action is needed. Invitations to schedule an appointment for vaccination are sent to eligible patients in waves based on availability of vaccine. Patients who are enrolled in the MyUofMHealth patient porta will receive invitations through email and portal message, and patients who are not enrolled in the patient portal will receive invitations by mail.

IHA/SAINT JOSEPH MERCY HEALTH SYSTEM PATIENTS:

Eligible IHA & St. Joe's Medical Group patients on the MyChart Patient Portal will be contacted in waves to schedule their COVID-19 vaccine appointments. They are first contacting eligible primary care patients, followed by specialty patients. Patients without MyChart will be contacted by phone. You are encouraged to sign up for MyChart as it will be the quickest way to schedule your vaccine once you have been contacted to do so.
