Beloved people of Bethlehem UCC, get ready to fly!

First, I want to begin by thanking everyone who filled out an evaluation on my performance. I appreciate your observations, comments and critiques. There are some lingering questions about Lombard report, plans for our interim work, and when/how the search process will begin. Most of these things were addressed in detail in my annual report. If you need a copy of that report, please contact the church office. But here is the Reader's Digest version:

Lombard Mennonite Peace Center (LMPC) Report

I applaud you for bringing LMPC in to help you with conflict resolution. That is their forte. And I believe your engagement with them has benefitted you. Here are a number of the highlights from their report and your progress with them.

Loss & Grief – You all were in the depths of grief when I arrived in July of 2023. You have made great strides in healing and reconciliation. Continue your good work in that regard, by tapping into your God-given gifts of love, compassion, forgiveness and understanding. Remember, grief never goes away. It transforms over time.

Communication concerns – Communication is a sticky-wicket that challenges every congregation. In the LMPC report, there were many facets of communication challenges cited. Some of them pointed to leadership lacking clarity on decisions made, as well as a sense of uncertainty over roles and responsibilities felt by some leaders. LMPC attributed these and others to inadequate organizational structure, as well as the need for leadership training. We are responding with:

Leadership workshops – To assist our leaders, the first workshop ("Spirituality of Leadership") is scheduled for September 8th. All elected and invited leaders have the opportunity to participate in this workshop. Another, ("Discovery in Leadership") may follow.

Other workshops — Other workshops may be offered to the congregation at-large, to help with communication and team-building.

ByLaws review – The LMPC report specifically called for "revisiting the organizational structure." That is precisely what the ByLaws committee is doing. It is painstaking work.

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Stay tuned for recommendations made on subsequent phases of the review process. Please give us your prompt feedback as we move along. Once this work is complete, and the entire congregation ratifies any changes to the ByLaws, we will have a strong foundation to build upon for future visioning. This is a crucial first step that will help with both communication and functionality of the church.

Declining membership – As I shared in my annual report, this is not a unique issue for Bethlehem. It is shared with most churches, across denominations. Yes, there were circumstances that contributed to Bethlehem's decline in recent years, including conflict that prompted consultation with LMPC. At this moment in time, BUCC has stabilized and begun to grow. The pace of growth is slow, and requires everyone to contribute to it. Here are some things required:

Hospitality & Welcome – You have made great strides in this regard! Healing within the congregation has contributed to renewed vibrancy – attractive to seekers. We still need everyone to be more conscious of new faces AND returning faces, greeting them with joy and the love of Christ. If you see someone you do not know, introduce yourself with a warm welcome – in the sanctuary AND at coffee hour. Do not let anyone new to the church stand or sit alone, especially at coffee hour.

Coffee Hour – The fellowship provided at coffee hour is an extension of the sacred space of worship. It is sacred ground where we have the opportunity and responsibility to BE the church AND the face of Christ. We cannot afford to fail in providing coffee hour. To not offer this time of fellowship, speaks loudly that 'this is not a friendly or welcoming community of faith, who simply does not care about others.' We do not want to give that kind of negative impression. It is extremely hard to overcome first impressions. And if that is how we are perceived, guests will not return. As you are able, sign up to be a coffee hour host. Need help? Just ask, those with experience will partner with you.

Spiritual Relevance – The church and both its purpose and worship need to be relevant to the lives of people today. What we do, beyond worship, needs to have a positive impact on the wider community. If people do not perceive that we are walking the walk, they won't give us the time of day. More on that below, under community engagement. As to worship, we are working to make worship relevant to today. This is why we have moved to using the New Century Hymnal, for contemporary, inclusive lyrics to old and new hymns. All of the NCH hymnals were donated to us. Both music and message need to provide hope in today's world. That is what we will continue to strive toward.

Community engagement – We need to engage more in the wider community. Some of you are doing this by partnering and participating with various community organizations. We need to do more of this. For example, at Ann Arbor Pride in August, the few of us who were there from BUCC provided a powerful counterpoint to those spreading hate and condemnation. We met so many who have been traumatized by the church (i.e. universal church), because of who they are. There were only a handful of churches present at AA Pride. We need to continue to be one of them. Some folks expressed a sincere interest in joining us for worship. One gentleman did on the following Sunday. We need to make our presence even bigger and better yet, at events like this and others. When folks, especially millennials and younger people, see us living what we claim that no matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here AND see us actually advocating for the marginalized, least of these in the greater community, they will be more inclined to join us.

Aging building – We can't change the age of the building. But we can and are pursuing diversified revenue streams to maintain and enhance this amazing structure. Decades ago, the lion's-share of financial burden fell to the congregation. Today, revenue diversification helps to augment what the congregation can provide. Here's what we're doing and what we might consider doing.

Grants – We've already received grants toward new Pride Doors (a powerful advertisement for the church) and for boiler repairs. We will continue to seek grants for specific building enhancements and improvements.

Rental – We are leveraging our building assets through good rental partners.

Fund Raisers – There are numerous fund-raising endeavors that are tried and true, like parking for the Art Fair and home football games. There are other possibilities that other churches have found successful, including in-person and virtual silent auctions, and online partners such as ShopRaise.

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If you're not familiar with ShopRaise, it is an organization that turns "everyday shopping into support for your church or faith community." They partner with thousands of online retailers, to glean a percentage of online purchases for the designated church or faith community. The possibilities of fundraising are as endless as our imaginations.

This highlights most of the main concerns lifted up by the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center. Please note that LMPC accomplished what they initially set out to do. The torch has been passed to me, to get you to and over the finish-line. That is precisely what I intend to do. If anyone is interested in discussing the Lombard report in a small group setting, please let me know by September 15th, so that we can get it on the calendar.

What's Next?

Beginning this fall, I will be engaging the entire congregation in the work we need to do, to prepare you to call your next settled pastor. Ultimately, we need to answer three BIG questions: 1) "Who is Bethlehem UCC (today)?", 2) "Who is our Neighbor?", and 3) "Who is God calling Bethlehem to be/to become?" To answer these, we need everyone to participate in the upcoming workshops, surveys, etc. Through the various exercises, I will guide our focus in key areas that include: heritage, leadership (laity & pastoral), connections (within the congregation & the wider community), mission and future. These are explained a bit more in my annual report and will be explained further as we focus on each one. Why do we need to do all this?

Discernment – We need to discern who BUCC is and is becoming. Your discerned identity will not only impact church growth and its future path, it will directly impact who you call as a new settled pastor. That person needs to be a good fit, to partner with you into the future YOU envision, with the help of God.

Church Profile – The church profile is a document that serves as BUCC's ad and resume for prospective clergy. Your discernment process will generate much of the information needed for that church profile. Who writes the profile? – the Search Committee.

Search Committee – We will be ready to form and commission a Search Committee, once we have accomplished the lion's share of our discernment work together. As I consider who to recommend for the Search Committee, I need to look for a broad cross-section of the membership, who bring great diversity of ideas, perspectives and experience. Their first charge will be to complete the church profile. I will help them with that task. Once the profile is submitted and endorsed by the Michigan Conference of the United Church of Christ, it will be posted for clergy through the National setting. Then, the Committee will engage in the search and call process of reviewing clergy profiles that are received. Conference Staff will guide and support the Committee with the Search and Call process.

Search and Call: Based on the church's profile, the Search Committee will discern which candidates might be considered. Interviews of prospective candidates and their references, will help guide the committee in narrowing the field of candidates. The top candidates will be asked to preach in a neutral pulpit (at another church outside the greater Ann Arbor area), followed by further interviews. Once they have discerned the best candidate for Bethlehem, that individual will be invited for a Candidate Sunday. It is actually more of a candidate weekend, in which there are numerous opportunities for the congregation to meet and engage with the candidate, in casual settings. On Sunday of that weekend, the candidate preaches and leads in worship. Following the service, the candidate is sequestered away, and a congregational meeting is convened to discuss and ultimately vote to accept or reject the candidate for the next settled pastor. If accepted, plans are laid for transitioning to receive the new pastor. Many clergy have 90-day clauses in their call agreements. So, expect a delay from voting to the pastor actually starting to serve you. If rejected, the Search Committee goes back to the drawing board, perhaps looking more closely at another top candidate or receiving more clergy profiles.

As you can see, there is much to be done. And I cannot emphasize enough the importance of the process. Yes, it takes time. But I project that by the summer of 2025 you will be well underway in the search and call process and perhaps even preparing to receive your new pastor. What about me? I will be walking with you throughout the journey. As I said earlier, I intend to get you to and over the finish line. Even after I depart from you, you will remain in my prayers. Now, let's do this!

We had out first regular meeting this past week, following the annual congregation meeting this past Sunday. Our first business item was to elect the board officers for this next fiscal year. We have a full slate, and first with sincere thanks to Jim Lutz for his most recent six years of service, in addition to past years of board service. Thank you, Jim for your steady hand, and wisdom leading and guarding our resources carefully. We welcome you in an advisory capacity, now and in the future, you are willing to provide.

Marilyn Pearson has joined the board in her first term as elected member, and Susan Irwin for her first elected term, as elected member, following her completion of one year, filling an unexpired term. Both Marilyn and Susan bring much knowledge and strength as previous board members, and past board presidents.

Elected for board officer position's, are Mary Friend, vice president, Shannon O'Reilly as secretary, Jamie Dylenski as treasurer, and Mary Jean Raab as president.

Several projects were approved at our meeting and will be in motion immediately. The full proposal is laid out over the next four months.


