"Do this in remembrance of me." (Luke 22:19b)



I just had an interesting encounter. Two very pleasant women came to our front door, inviting me to join them in celebrating Jesus' memorial. They clarified for me that this is a celebration of his death, quoting Luke 22:19 as the reason for this celebration. First, I explained that I am a pastor, currently serving you. Then, I

shared that we would most certainly be remembering his death on Good Friday and, more importantly, celebrating his resurrection on Easter morning. They were surprised by this. They asked me, "Why celebrate his resurrection more than his death?" My mind raced, wondering why anyone would end his story in the grave. To do so would reduce him to simply being a martyr. So, I explained, "His resurrection demonstrates the awesome power and love of God, by conquering sin and death. It is all about forgiveness." We shared some pleasantries before they left. As they were leaving, they appeared to be very perplexed. I pray that I sowed a seed that will flourish into a new and more complete understanding about the love of God known to us through Christ.

You see, our journey through Lent, takes us to the foot of the cross and the grave. On April 17th, when we join with other congregations for the ecumenical Maundy Thursday service (7:00pm at First Congregational), we will celebrate Holy Communion. We will hear those words again, 'On the night of his betrayal, Jesus took bread; and after giving thanks he broke it and gave it to his disciples saying, "Take and eat, this is my body broken for you. <u>Do this in remembrance of me.</u>" In the same manner during the meal, he took the cup, and again after giving thanks said, "Drink of this, all of you. This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sin. <u>Do this in remembrance of me.</u>" We hear these words every time we celebrate communion. But do we always remember the profound weight that they carry? We must remember that following that Passover meal, Jesus was betrayed, arrested, abandoned, denied, tortured and hung on a cross to die. We need to feel the full weight and sorrow of all of that – because THIS is the full demonstration of God's love for us. But the story cannot end in the grave. The grave and its significance must dramatically contrast his resurrection on Easter morning. Therein lies the magnitude of God's love for us – love that can never be taken from us. As Paul wrote in his letter to the Corinthians, 'Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where O death is your victory; where is your sting?' Christ makes all things new!

Merciful and gracious God, we thank you for your amazing love. We thank you for walking with us on the rough road of life — a road with which you are deeply familiar through Christ Jesus. Help us to remember his gift of forgiveness. Help us to remember that "Do this in remembrance of me" is not reserved for communion. Truly, it is Jesus' call to us to share your profound love in our dark and hurting world, for the sake of all your beloved children. In his name we pray. Amen.

"We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers, constantly remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. For we know, brothers and sisters beloved by God, that he has chosen you, because our message of the gospel came to you not in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction; just as you know what kind of people we proved to be among you for your sake. And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, for in spite of persecution you received the word with joy inspired by the Holy Spirit, so that you became an example to all the believers." (I Thessalonians 1: 2 -7 NRSV)

Some thoughts from Pastor Diane during Lent:

St. Paul was writing this letter to the church he, Silvanus, and Timothy founded in Thessaly, on the Aegean Sea. After leaving the city and founding several more churches, Paul sent Timothy back to the Thessalonians to see how they were doing. This letter is in response to the glowing report from Timothy brought back to Paul.

How many times do we hear good things about others or have a wonderful experience created by someone and yet we fail to acknowledge their gift to us? So often we take and forget to give – give back in gratitude for all that has been given us by God through others. Many post offices are closing on Saturdays and postage has gone up and up for lack of first-class mail. The art of letter writing seems almost extinct, yet a note or a letter has a personal, positive lasting affect on the reader and, as we see in Thessalonians, on many others for 2,000 years.

Gratitude, appreciation, acknowledgement of the Holy Spirit working around and among us is what Paul is doing in this letter. He is bringing encouragement to the discouraged in a way that they can receive it over and over and over to gain strength. We can do the same thing in this day and age when encouragement is so very much needed by all. We can make a difference in peoples lives with a simple note, card or letter of gratitude. It may be all they need to keep going.

Prayer:

O God, help us see and acknowledge the goodness in others and be grateful to You for placing them in our lives.
