# From the

#### Only you can prevent forest fires.

"You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment. ... So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and

offer your gift." (Matthew 5:21-22a & 24)

Have you noticed how anger and vitriol seem to be spilling over unchecked in our country and elsewhere in the world? It has resulted in the senseless and callous taking of lives, from innocent children in their Minnesota chapel at the start of the school year, to the assassination of prominent political figures. Murder is wrong, pure and simple, as we are told in the ten commandments and as Jesus reiterates. But what about anger?

Anger itself is not necessarily wrong. We should be angry at injustice in the world. Even Jesus became angry at and condemned injustice, crying out against it. We need to channel our anger, as Jesus and the prophets did, to dismantle systems of oppression and injustice. When anger is wrong is when we weaponize it against each other. Whether our anger was originally directed at someone because of wrongdoing or misdirected at others matters not. When anger does harm and results in violence, it's wrong. And we need to understand that the harm and violence that stem from it are preventable.

In Ephesians 4:26 we are told, "Be angry but do not sin; do not the let the sun go down on your anger." If we let the sun set on our anger, it tends to smolder and grow. Eventually it grows and bursts into flames and, in the process, consumes us along with everyone and everything in its path, like a raging forest fire. Jesus implores us to, in essence, throw water on the smoldering embers of our anger, by telling us to, "be reconciled with your brother or sister." We need to douse our anger

with one another so that its embers cannot spark a forest fire. Only we can douse our anger, no one else can do it for us. As Smokey the Bear says, "Only you can prevent forest fires."

Reconciliation begins deep in our hearts with the love of God. The choice is ours to act on it – to use God's love to put out the embers of anger, before they destroy our relationships. It's easy to be childish and say, 'but they started it!' It takes courage and integrity to face the one we are angry with and have a conversation. We may find that our anger resulted from a misunderstanding, as is often the case. Even if we were wronged, should we not offer the same forgiveness that we receive through Christ? That's what we profess every time we pray the Lord's prayer – "Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us." Forgiveness and love are the cooling water that can snuff out the embers of anger and allow us to be reconciled. Then we can face the trials and tribulations of this life TOGETHER. And TOGETHER we can transform the world for the better. May it be so. Amen.

### **Bethlehem Cemetery**

This devotional was read at the beginning of our recent Cemetery Board Meeting. It is intended for the beginning of Lent but is appropriate anytime. This was written by Yael Lachmann, a UCC minister and speaks to the sacredness of the space we are charged with caring for.

"For many years, the route of my morning run took me along a river and through the grounds of an old cemetery. As I followed the cemetery's winding paths, my racing mind would begin to settle. By the time I got home, I knew which items on my to-do list mattered most and which were actually not important at all. Maybe it was the fresh morning air, or the negative ions rising off the river. But I'm pretty sure that the clarity I found each morning had a lot to do with the cemetery itself.

Running past the graves of those who had once lived and worked and loved in that place, I couldn't help noticing the dates on their headstones and doing the math in my head: this one lived nearly 90 years, this one only 38. Each morning, those gravestones served as a tangible reminder that our days are always numbered. Every day, that cemetery offered me a gentle invitation to count my own days, and to make wiser choices about how I spend them.

It's not unlike the invitation we receive on Ash Wednesday, as we feel the touch of ashes on our forehead and hear the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This week as we prepare to follow Jesus into the wilderness of Lent, we too are invited to reflect - as he does – on what is most important in this life. This Lenten season, we are called to decide what in this beautiful, broken world is truly worthy of our numbered days, our finite attention, our life's energy... and what is not. May we choose well."
